

A Note from Fr. Geoff

Dear Brothers and Sisters,

Last week, as I traveled on business for Trinity seminary, I had a wonderful opportunity to spend an afternoon at a sacred shrine, El Santuario de Chimayo in New Mexico. A little adobe church, El Santuario was built between 1813 and 1816 over the spot where a miracle was said to have occurred:

On Good Friday, 1810, a local landowner saw, in the hills of Chimayo, a patch of land glowing. He began digging in the spot of the light and found, to his surprise, a large crucifix. It was carried 8 miles to the nearest church and set up for veneration, but the next day it was gone - miraculously returned to the spot from which it was dug. This happened three times. After the third time, the local bishop instructed that a church be built over that spot - the church that still stands today.

It's a small place, and very ornate in the folk art style of much Mexican Catholic art - bright colors, stylized figures, sometimes gruesome in detail. Crutches, baby shoes, photographs, and *milagros* left behind by pilgrims witness to the miracles that are said to take place at this holy shrine. I knelt at the site where the cross had been found, to the left of the main altar, and prayed for those back home before taking some of the sacred dirt to bring back for our family icon corner.

What strikes me whenever I have the good fortune to visit holy sites in various cultures is how *different* our spiritualities can be. The polychrome, graphic nature of Mexican art is so vastly different from our staid and stoic Byzantine iconography. How different is the music of a festive Spanish folk Mass from our heritage of Carpatho-Rusyn plainchant! And yet, beneath the surface, there is something profound that holds us all together in the Christian Faith. St. Paul wrote, "There is one body [the Church] and one Spirit, just as you were called to the one hope that belongs to your call; one Lord, one faith, one baptism; one God and Father of all, who is over all and through all and in all." (Eph. 4.4-6)

And this diversity, far from being a cause of division in the church, is actually a sign of the *catholicity*, the *universality* of the Church. Christ came to redeem all of humanity in our various cultures and contexts. It is this diversity of spirituality within the one Catholic family that enables the Word of God to be proclaimed and heard throughout the world. Let us give thanks for the many gifts of the Holy Spirit which find expression in many and various ways! Gloria a Jesuchristo! Gloria por siempre!

Nativity Fast Nov.15 - Dec.24

The six weeks prior to Christmas (the Nativity of our Lord in the Flesh) is a fasting period that many call Advent. Advent means "coming." It is that period of time when we find ourselves waiting for the coming of the Messiah, the Anointed One, the Christ. (All three terms mean the same thing.)

For most of us, we are anxious to get to the feast — we want the days to rush by. Our preparation usually consists of shopping and decorating, not to speak of the endless parties that we are invited to attend. Here is where the notion of waiting comes into play. We must

discipline ourselves through self-control and patience. We are to read the Scriptures, specifically the prophecies that speak of the coming of the Messiah. We are to turn our focus to a Godly way of life that calls for sacrificing and almsgiving (acts of mercy). Let us think of charity and the giving of our time, talents, and resources to others that may be in need. There is no better way to imitate Christ than to be loving and charitable towards others.

A word to the wise — put Christ back into Christmas. Find the meaning of the feast by understanding the importance of the Son of God taking on human flesh. Remember the real reason for the season is that Jesus, the Son of God, the Messiah, came into the world and dwelt among men, taking on Himself the sins of the world so that we might have life in Him.

During this fast it was the custom to observe a strict abstinence on Monday, Wednesday, and Friday and a lesser abstinence (mitigation from wine and oil) on Tuesdays and Thursdays. The Ruthenian Metropolia has identified this period as a penitential season. This fast may be observed voluntarily, partially or in its entirety.

Neither the priest nor the Levite was his neighbor, but – as the teacher of the law himself answered – "he who showed pity" was his neighbor. The Savior says, "Go and do likewise." (Origen)
