



A Note from Fr. Geoff

Dear Sisters and Brothers,

This past Sunday, Pope Francis issued his latest Apostolic Exhortation, C'est la Confiance, which takes its French title from one of the Letters of St. Thérèse of Lisieux, the "Little Flower of Jesus." In it, she writes, "It is confidence and nothing but confidence that must lead us to love."

In this writing, the holy father exhorts us to have a strong and certain confidence in the love and mercy of God our loving Father. Speaking of St. Thérèse, he writes, "her boundless confidence encourages all who feel frail, limited and sinful to let themselves be elevated and transformed in order to reach greater heights." St. Thérèse is, of course, known for her "little way," her spirituality of simplicity, confidence, and trust in the love of God. She writes, "Jesus does not demand great actions from us, but simply surrender and gratitude."

I wonder how many of us would describe our spiritual life as stemming from confidence, surrender, and gratitude. Do we have <u>confidence</u> in Jesus, who loved us and gave himself as a sacrifice for our salvation and restoration? Do we trust his words when he says, "All that the Father gives me will come to me, and whoever comes to me I will never cast out" (John 6.37)? Do we <u>surrender</u> ourselves to his will, believing that all that comes to us is, by divine Providence, for our good? For Jesus said, "Come to me, all you who labor and are heavily burdened, and I will give you rest" (Matt. 11.28). Are we aware of God's great goodness to us? Do we live our spiritual lives and drudgery and obligation - or do we live out of a sense of gratitude for the many ways that he shows us his loving-kindness, his patience, and his care?

C'est la Confiance speaks of this spiritual posture in the words of St.Thérèse, as an "invitation to a holy abandonment." It is an "abandonment in love" which "sets us free from obsessive calculations, constant worry about the future and fears that take away our peace."

Brothers and Sisters, let us abandon ourselves, more and more, to love - the Love of Christ which, St. Paul tells us, has been poured into our hearts (Romans 5.5). And let us take Jesus at his word when he says that he loves the *whole* world (John 3.16) and that those who believe in him will not be cast out (John 6.37). Realizing this great gift of grace, we can be at peace with our Lord and with each other. And we can trust God for our good both now and into the future. Let us trust his words:

"Peace I leave with you; my peace I give to you. Not as the world gives do I give you. Let not your hearts be troubled, neither let them be afraid." (John 14.27)

The parable of the rich man and Lazarus uncovers a little the veil over the world to come and gives us an opportunity to understand worldly existence with eternity in view. In the light of this parable, we see that earthly goods are not so much happiness as they are a test of our ability to love and help our neighbors. "If therefore ye have not been faithful in the unrighteous mammon," says the Lord in the conclusion of the previous parable, "who will commit to your trust the true riches?" This means that if we do not know how to manage the illusory riches we have today, then we will not be worthy to receive the real treasure from God, the treasure which was intended for us in the future life. Thus, let us remind ourselves that our worldly goods in fact belong to God. He uses them to test us.

The Holy & Glorious Demetrius of Thessalonica, October 26

The Holy Great Martyr Demetrius of Thessalonica was the son of a Roman proconsul in Thessalonica. Three centuries had elapsed and Roman paganism, spiritually shattered and defeated by the multitude of martyrs and confessors of the Savior, intensified its persecutions. The parents of St Demetrius were secretly Christians, and he was baptized and raised in the Christian Faith in a secret church in his father's home.

By the time Demetrius had reached maturity and his father had died, the emperor Galerius Maximian had ascended the throne (305). Maximian, confident in Demetrius' education as well as his administrative and military abilities, appointed him to his father's position as proconsul of the Thessalonica district. The main tasks



of this young commander were to defend the city from barbarians and to eradicate Christianity. The emperor's policy regarding Christians was expressed simply, "Put to death anyone who calls on the name of Christ." The emperor did not suspect that by appointing Demetrius he had provided a way for him to lead many people to Christ. Accepting the appointment, Demetrius returned to Thessalonica and immediately confessed and glorified our Lord Jesus Christ. Instead of persecuting and executing Christians, he began to teach the Christian Faith openly to the inhabitants of the city and to overthrow pagan customs and idolatry.

The compiler of his Life, St Simeon Metaphrastes, says that because of his teaching zeal he became "a second Apostle Paul" for Thessalonica, particularly since "the Apostle to the Gentiles" once founded at this city the first community of believers (1 Thess. and 2 Thess.).

The Lord also destined St Demetrius to follow the holy Apostle Paul as a martyr..." He began to pray and fast, preparing himself for martyrdom. When the emperor came into the city, he summoned Demetrius, who boldly confessed himself a Christian and denounced the falsehood and futility of Roman polytheism. Maximian gave orders to lock up the confessor in prison. At dawn on October 26, 306, soldiers appeared in the saint's underground prison and ran him through with lances. The body of the holy Great Martyr Demetrius was cast out for wild animals to devour, but the Christians took it and secretly buried it in the earth.

Did you Know?

October 26 is **Carpatho-Rusyn Day** in North America (*Our heritage*). The Carpatho-Rusyn Consortium of North America, a coalition of six cultural organizations representing the Rusyn people, designated October 26 as Carpatho-Rusyn Day in the United States and Canada.

October 26 was chosen to commemorate a gathering at Independence Hall in Philadelphia in 1918, at which Carpatho-Rusyns were recognized for the first time as a distinct nationality by the members of the Mid-European Union as well as the U.S. government.
