



A Note from Fr. Geoff

Dear Brothers and Sisters,

This past week we began the Nativity Fast and this coming week we will, sort of ironically, celebrate the "feast" of Thanksgiving. It is an anomaly that in America we have this national celebration and feast in the middle of a penitential season of fasting. But whether at a time of feast or of fasting, it is <u>always</u> appropriate for us to give thanks to God. Gratitude is a great virtue from which many other virtues proceed.

As the days get shorter and the nights longer, I thought the following part (Ikos 4) of the Akathist of Thanksgiving would be an appropriate meditation for this week.

When the sun sets on earth,
when reigns the calm of sleep unending
and the silence of the fading day,
I see your bridal chamber beneath the image of shining tents,
and the dawn of tabernacles in the clouds.
Fire and purple, gold and deep blue,
prophetically they speak of the unspeakable beauty of your dwellings,
and in triumph cry aloud: Let us go to the Father!

Glory to you, in the quiet hour of evening.
Glory to you, outpouring great calm upon the world.
Glory to you for the farewell ray of the setting sun.
Glory to you for the rest of healing sleep.
Glory to you for the goodness of darkness
when the world is far away.
Glory to you for the tender emotion of a soul moved to prayer.
Glory to you for the promised awakening to joy everlasting,
of the day without ending.
Glory to you, O God, unto the ages.

I pray that in this time of year when we spend more time in darkness than in light, you would be given many "quiet hours" of God's "great calm" poured out upon you. 

St. Philips Fast Nov.15 - Dec.24

"But you", He said, "Who do you say that I am?" Then Simon Peter spoke up, "You are the Christ," he said, "the Son of the living God." Matthew 16:15-16. "Who do you say that I am?" Was there ever such a penetrating question? Our answer to this question reveals not only who we think Christ is, but also who we are. Many of those who first heard Jesus ask this question were men and women of the Law. This is why they thought Jesus only a prophet. But Simon Peter could truly see Jesus for Who He Is. In his answer Peter revealed himself to be a man of God. What of our answers to the question of



Jesus? What do our answers say about us? Are we men filled with the Holy Spirit? One of the most ancient titles Christians give themselves was "Christ-bearers." From the very first we have been aware that we are called "to bear the mysteries of God," to bear Christ to the world. As we prepare to greet Christ in His Nativity and His Baptism in the Jordan, we should look to our life. Do we bear Christ in all of our life, or only in those parts of our life we consider "religious" or "spiritual"? May our life during this season bear witness to the reality that "Christ is among us!" May our life answer that Jesus is "the Christ, the Son of the living God."

Entrance of the Theotokos into the Temple

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Today is the prelude of God's benevolence and the herald of our salvation; for the Virgin openly appears in the Temple of God and foretells Christ to all. Let us also with full voice exclaim to her; Rejoice, Fulfillment of the Creator's plan!

The Feast Day of the Entrance of the Mother of God into the Temple is not recorded in the Gospels. Rather it is a story derived from an ancient text known as the Protoevangelion of James which some scholars think dates to the 1st century AD and



preserves some authentic traditions which were not included in the canonical Gospels. The Church makes heavy use of this text for her understanding of many of the events in the life of the Theotokos and the early life of Christ.

According to the Protoevangelion, as we see presented in the icon, Mary, a child of promise born to the childless couple Joachim and Anna, was promised by her parents to be returned to God. When she was three-years old, her parents brought her to the Temple; she was received by the priest Zacharias, the future father of St. John the Baptist. To their surprise, not only did Mary have no desire to return to her parents, she, in fact, did a "dance of joy" on the third step of the altar, and ran up the stairs to the Holy of Holies where she spent about the next 10 years living in the presence of God and being fed by an angel.

The icon, naturally, focuses on Mary being received by Zacharias, who is wearing the little "pill box" hat which indicates a prophet. The main theme of the feast of Mary's entrance to the Temple, repeated many times in the liturgical services, is that she enters the temple to become herself the Living Temple of God, thus inaugurating the New Testament in which are fulfilled the prophecies of old that "the dwelling of God is with man" and that the human person is the sole proper dwelling place of the Divine Presence. (Ezekiel 37:27; John 14:15-23). Thus, the feast of the Entrance of the Theotokos into the Temple celebrates the end of the physical temple in Jerusalem as the dwelling place of God. In this feast, we also celebrate that - in the person of the Theotokos - we, too, are the house and tabernacle of the Lord.




