#### **Excerpt from Christ our Pascha: The Incarnation of the Son of God**

*The Nativity of Christ:* The Church celebrates the coming of the Son of God into the world with the feast of the Nativity of Christ. The birth of Christ is announced to the shepherds by the angel of the Lord: "To you is born this day in the city of David a Savior, who is the Christ, the Lord" (Lk 2:11). The Fathers of the Church extolled Christmas night as a day of joy and peace:

#### A Note from Fr. Geoff

Dear Brothers and Sisters,

We are just about two weeks away from the celebration of the Nativity of Our Lord. As St. John the Theologian wrote, "the Word was made flesh, and dwelt among us." This *Word* - the *Logos*, or reason, or rational principle) - of God was in the beginning with God and was God himself from all eternity. It is *this* eternal Word that became flesh in the womb of the Blessed Virgin Mary.

In addition to being the *Logos - Word* of God, Christ is also the *Wisom* ("sophia") of God. St. Paul calls Christ "the power of God and the wisdom of God." This Wisdom, the Word, was long-awaited by the people who "walked in darkness" (Isaiah 9:2).

Recently, I've been rereading the poetry of the contemporary British poet, clergyman, and professor Malcolm Guite. Here is one of his sonnets for Advent, which I think captures something of our waiting for God's Wisdom to come down, to be incarnate, and to re-create us.

Nor can I speak unless I have been spoken;
I cannot teach except as I am taught,
Or break the bread except as I am broken.
O Mind behind the mind through which I seek,
O Light within the light by which I see,
O Word beneath the words with which I speak,
O founding, unfound Wisdom, founding me,
O sounding Song whose depth is sounding me,
O Memory of time, reminding me,
My Ground of Being, always grounding me,
My Maker's bounding line, defining me:
Come, hidden Wisdom, come with all you bring,
Come to me now, disguised as everything.

I cannot think unless I have been thought,

As we await the celebration of the first Coming of Christ and look forward to his Second Coming in power and great glory, let us invoke Jesus Christ, the Word and Wisdom of God the Father, that he may enlighten our minds, fill our hearts, and empower our hands to serve him.



### Twenty-Eighth Sunday after Pentecost

And as they went they were cleansed. Then one of them, when he saw that he was healed, turned back, praising God with a loud voice; and he fell on his face at Jesus's feet, giving Him thanks.

In healing the ten lepers, Jesus revealed his power and glory. Yet only one of the lepers returned to acknowledge Jesus' glory and to give Him thanks. And that one was a Samaritan, a foreigner. What happened to the other nine? What went wrong with them that went right with the Samaritan? The nine were right with the Samaritan? The nine were blinded to the truth of what Jesus did and who He was. They were so wrapped up in themselves, in their illness and their healing, that they failed to give glory to the One who cleansed them.



Are we so different? We live in an age when the experiences and accomplishments of this world are the only things that are held to be of any value. As we read in St. Paul's second letter to the Corinthians 4:4: "The god of this world [Satan] has blinded the minds of the unbelievers, to keep them from seeing the light of the gospel of the glory of Christ, who is the likeness of God". There is a spiritual battle going on in the world and in us. Satan is out to take away the vision of Jesus as our healer.

The Fathers of the Church see a lesson in today's Gospel reading for us. The ten lepers signify mankind. We are all leprous, but only one in ten give thanks to God for the salvation He has brought to us. In the same way, only some of the seed sown by God (in the Parable of the Sower) brings forth good fruit. We can all be cleansed by Him, but if we do not return to Him in gratitude and to glorify Him, we cannot be saved.

It is only by the power of the Holy Spirit that we can win the battle that is going on inside us. The role of the Holy Spirit is to reveal to us who Jesus is and to convict us of our state. As we see that we are infected with the leprosy of sin, and as we experience the healing that Jesus has performed within us through the shedding of His blood on the cross, we can turn back to Him, fall on our knees at his feet, and thank Him, acknowledging His power and glory.

Come, O Jesus, our Savior, redeem and save us!

#### The Theotokos of Guadalupe, Patroness of the Americas

The Theotokos of Guadalupe, who first appeared on Dec. 9, 1531 in Mexico to St. Juan Diego, bestowing on him an icon "not made with human hands," requesting that a church be built in her honor on that mountain. Her shrine there is one of the most celebrated places of pilgrimage in the Americas. Pope John Paul II named her the Patroness of the Americas.

#### How do you glorify God?

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The Lord expressed love for the one who was thankful, but He was angry with the ungrateful ones because they did not acknowledge their Deliverer. They thought more highly of their cure from leprosy than of He who had healed them. ... The one who returned to give thanks was given much more than the rest. Besides being healed of his leprosy, he was told by the Lord, "Stand up and go on your way. Your faith has saved you." You see, those who give thanks and those who glorify have the same kind of feelings. They bless their helper for the benefits they have received. This is why Paul urged everyone to "glorify God with your body." (1 Cor 6:20). (Saint Athanasius)
