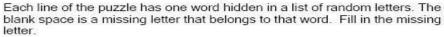

A Note from Fr. Geoff

Dear Sisters and Brothers,

The Sunday of the Publican and the Pharisee, the first pre-Lenten Sunday, focuses on the famous story from St. Luke's Gospel. It is a story of how *humility* is what is able to "justify" us before God. In many ways, humility is the most significant of virtues, because humility is about knowing who we are and who God is, and not getting the two confused!

Humility is not about debasing ourselves or thinking poorly of ourselves. Rather, it is thinking of ourselves in relation to God and his goodness and grace. It is not about considering ourselves *worthless* - we certainly aren't! It is about recognizing that we are *unworthy* and the God's mercy and grace are what give us our human dignity.

Humility is also about how we interact with each other, knowing that God loves, cares for, and is merciful to the other just as much as he is to me. Humility includes allowing God's grace to flow *through me* to my neighbors. St. Gregory of Sinai wrote,

True humility does not say humble words, nor does it assume humble looks, it does not force oneself either to think humbly of oneself, or to abuse oneself in belittlement.... The manifestations and the various aspects of humility, humility itself is a grace, given from above. There are two kinds of humility, as the holy fathers teach: to deem oneself lowest of all beings, and to ascribe to God all one's good actions. The first is the beginning, the second is the end.

To be humble is, as St. Paul teaches us, to:

Let love be genuine....Love one another with brotherly affection. Outdo one another in showing honor. (Romans 12.9-10)

Brothers and sisters, as we are just a few weeks away from Lent, let us pray earnestly for the grace of true humility: that we may not think less of ourselves, but think of ourselves less; and that we may know our dependence on the mercy of God; and that we may outdo one another in showing honor. And may the Lord who has begun a good work in us, bring it to pass.

Sunday of Publican and Pharisee

"I tell you, this man went down to his house justified rather than the other; for everyone who exalts himself will be humbled, but he who humbles himself will be exalted."

Today in the Gospel we are reminded that there are two "ways" in which we can walk in this life and the outcome or goal of those ways are strikingly different. The first of those "ways" is the way of the world, in which financial success and reputation are prioritized and the ultimate goal is personal aggrandizement, no matter the "way" in which it is attained. The second "way" is the way of God, in which charity and honesty are not only prioritized, but are the way and the goal as well.



In other words, the second "way," the way of God, is a good in itself, for this "way" is the life of God or eternal life. Following this second "way" leads one to look beyond themselves and live in a way that is always oriented towards others. Just as God the Father, from all eternity, poured out his life in love to the Son, so the one who walks the second "way" lives a life which is a constant act of self-giving love.

Please notice that both "ways" have an interior and hidden aspect that greatly affect which path or "way" that we walk in this life and ultimately it greatly affects how we will live forever. While one may outwardly appear to be walking in the "way" of God, as the Pharisee in the Gospel must have appeared to those around him, it is possible for that person to actually be walking the opposite path in life due to the hidden or interior disposition of his heart.

Questions to Ponder

Do we often live a double-life? Do we act polite and nice to those around us while harboring resentment or anger toward those same people? Do we say one thing with our mouths and think another thing with our heart?

In the Divine Liturgy do we pray for everyone and ask for God's mercy and forgiveness? Have we truly forgiven others in the way that we ask God to forgive us?

Is there someone in our life whom we are angry with or that we have not really forgiven from our heart? Can we find a way to forgive them and show them that we love them?

Don't Hide from Yourself

To sustain my mask before others takes much energy. One clever way to maintain my mask and to avoid seeing myself as I am, is to continuously compare my actions with the actions of those persons whom I consider less than myself. And into what a clever trap I have fallen, for I will always find someone whose outward actions appear to fall short of mine. I will constantly be looking outward toward others and never inward at the movements of my own heart. I will have taken upon myself the heart of the Pharisee, puffed up with emptiness, judgmental and condemning, while thanking God that I am not like another. I will have taken upon myself the heart of the Pharisee, but because of my mask, I will only know myself as the Publican.

The observance of Sunday and the Holy Days of Obligation prescribes that we: 1) assist at the Divine Liturgy, and 2) abstain from servile work. Assistance at the Divine Liturgy on Sunday was always a serious obligation in the Church. This obligation was considered so important for the early Christians that they were ready to expose themselves to persecution rather than to miss the celebration of the Holy Liturgy. Among the Church Precepts, reprinted in every Byzantine Rite Catholic Catechism since the time of the Holy Union, we always read in the first place: "On Sundays and Holydays of Obligation abstain from your worldly (daily) work and assist at the Divine Liturgy." This refers to the first printed Ruthenian Catechism, published by Bishop J . J . de Camillis, OSBM of Mukachevo in 1698. Since that time the obligation to attend the Divine Liturgy on Sunday was constantly imposed on our faithful. The precept to "keep holy" Sunday and the Holydays of Obligation is a serious one and is binding in conscience, unless there is a sufficient reason excusing us from the obligation. Hence the Synod of Laodicea stated: "whenever they can," and as far as possible.

First All-Souls Saturday: (February 3)

This venerable custom was transmitted to us by our ancestors as a part of our beautiful spiritual heritage. Every year, just before Meat-Fare Saturday, the families give the lists of their departed loved ones (Hramoty) to the pastor with the request that they be mentioned at the services held for the deceased on the All Souls Saturday. And St. John Chrysostom assures us that: "It is a great honor to be worthy of mention, while the celebration of the Holy Mysteries is going on."

(Homily on the Acts 21, 4)

Members of the family are encouraged to attend these services on the All Souls Saturdays for by their presence and by their personal prayers and receiving Holy Communion they strengthen the bond of love with their departed loved ones and indeed keep their memory everlasting!

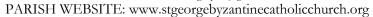
