

### A Note from Fr. Christiaan

#### Dear Parishioners.

At the risk of turning the priest's column into the Pierogi Diaries... I extended my pierogi tour at St. Mary's last week, knowing this to be their last week. I hope to next revisit St. George's, Aliquippa in May. Our seminarians often hear from ancient-of-days clergy at your Seminary in Pittsburgh that new priests won't be much good if they can't pinch a pierogi. Having transferred from Indianapolis (and therefore unfamiliar with any delicacy not made with corn) I was once just like a seminarian, puzzled by pierogi-wisdom uttered by long-in-the-tooth pastors scaring seminarians straight, lest they veer off the right path to sit in the rectory to watch TV – as young men were wont to do until recent times.

Now, of course, TV is a thing of the past. So, my first Byzantine parish in Tarentum turned out to be a nut-roll only establishment. At St. Mary's, I had hoped my nut-roll swagger would have impressed the pinchers and cooks, but no matter how I spun my heroic deeds of yore to the kitchen about my former parish, George's spellbinding collection of fish stories had clearly vitiated their minds so that my tales left everyone unimpressed. Consequently, I took my humble place as a newbie cook this week. I did of course espy the beginning of the dough-making process, how the flour and ingredients were mixed and how they were trucked off, Henry-Ford style, an assembly line. My role was to take newly formed pierogis, dump them into large cauldrons, stir them relentlessly until I agitated them to pop their heads up to the surface of the water, in a sort of catch and release program, I'd scoop them up in a sort of fishing net, throw them into cold water to shock 'em, and then release the dazed pierogi into a serene pool where they would get comfortable, completely unaware of the fate that awaited them in the matter of minutes: To be covered in butter and unions, sold, and never to be seen again.

The catch and release program was *mostly* successful, but my training had been lackluster, as I was not forewarned that pierogis can get agitated in boiling water. So, when you catch them in the net, they have a tendency to jump out and fall on the floor. Apparently, a pierogi that has successfully reached its longed-for freedom out of the hunter's snare is no longer able to held in captivity, and sold off, so it has to be put down. I admit, and not because of having butterfingers, pierogis were lost on my watch. In all honesty, pierogi making is among the more pleasant experiences I've had in ministry... No, I have not reflected on or examined how or why that could possibly be, and don't intend to do so! The philosophers' conundrum remains: whether it is better to say that "the unexamined life is not worth living," or "the unlived life is not worth examining"! At any rate, our volunteers often thanked me for being there. My immediate feeling (and stated response) was: "If you weren't here, then I couldn't even be here"! While I meant to convey that their volunteering allowed me as a priest to minister and be present as our churches' needs rely on this as our supplementary income... my attempt to be deep led one savvy volunteer to trade philosophical profundities (he equally thought he'd put me at ease by letting me know he had not beaten up a priest since he was an altar boy): "Well Fr., wherever you find yourself, there you are." I realized that this reformed hammerof-clergy was none too impressed by Sphinx-like riddled way of saying thanks. So, thank you St. Mary's volunteers, we could not exist in the Ambridge community without you!

# Sunday of the Samaritan Woman Epistle:

In today's Epistle we hear of the early Evangelical work of the Church as the Gospel message spread beyond Jerusalem to the city of Antioch, the birthplace of the Melkite Church, and began to take root in the hearts of those who were not of the "chosen race." This initial sharing of the Gospel with non-Jews would cause great concern among some in the Jerusalem Christian Community and eventually the Council of the Apostle would be called to consider how to deal with this situation. By placing this epistle within the context of the Gospel message, the church holds up Christ's Ministry as the example to be followed. Just as Jesus brought salvation to the Samaritan woman, and through her to the whole Samaritan Village,



so we cannot keep the Good News of Christ to ourselves and to our community alone. Today Christ calls each of us who have experienced the joy of the Gospel to share this gift with those whom we encounter. We have received our new life in Christ as a gift and therefore it is to be lived as a gift.

### **Challenge:**

We are told in our society today to keep religion out of the public sphere. We are told that we should not talk about religion in Social settings, in school, or at work. We are told that we should not proselytize and make convert to Christianity. We are told to leave others alone to follow their own path. But, if we are truly convinced that Christ is "the way, the truth, and the life," and this is true for all people, how can we possibly stay silent about something which impacts a person's salvation?

In what ways can we bring the message of Christ to others in a way that respects their freedom?

### Gospel:

For the Fifth Sunday of Pascha, the Byzantine tradition lifts up St. Photina, the Samaritan woman who met Christ at the well, as a representation of what Christ offers us as the fruit of his resurrection: the gift of the Holy Spirit.

It was not with a man, but with a woman, and not just any woman, but a Samaritan woman, a woman who was looked down upon by society, even by Jesus' disciples, who was called by him to share in the gifts of the kingdom of God. We all suffer an existential thirst, and the water of life, the Holy Spirit who flows from the Son, is able to satisfy that thirst, even as Jesus, the bread of life, is able to satisfy our spiritual hunger.

The Evangelist Apostle John was able to show the reordering of creation which would happen as a result of the Incarnation itself. Sin disfigured the world, and in that disfigurement, cracks were formed along the great chain of being, where relative distinctions became the basis for hostile division such as race against race, man against woman, and humanity against nature itself.

The light of grace unites everyone in the bond of love so that the effects of sin are overturned, and Together in the Holy Trinity ... One Faith, One Church, One Future! humanity finds itself united as one, "for you are all one in Christ Jesus" (Gal. 3:28b).

### A Brief History of St. George Church



At the turn of the century, many immigrants settled in the small community of Aliquippa along the Ohio River about 25 miles north of Pittsburgh. The iron and steel industry for which it became known had its beginnings during this time. Although there was no Byzantine Catholic Church conveniently located, the faithful made the necessary sacrifices to attend church on Sundays and Holy Days. This meant walking down to the bank of the Ohio River to board a boat to travel to the nearest churches, located in McKees Rocks and Pittsburgh's South Side.

Transportation improved somewhat with the advent of trains and more frequently scheduled stops. Despite the inconvenience, the faithful always managed to carry their Easter baskets to be blessed on Easter Sunday. Distance and time did

not deter them from worshiping and keeping their traditions.

Their desire to have their own church materialized after more families moved into the area. On March 15, 1915, the first Greek Catholic Church of Aliquippa was organized at the home of Andrew Kovacs. Under the leadership of Father Arnold Suba of McKees Rocks, property was purchased. Groundbreaking ceremonies for the church in honor of St. George, the Great Martyr, took place in May of 1916. The church was



completed in 1917 and was consecrated on July 4, 1917, by Very Reverend Gabriel Martyak, Apostolic Administrator. Among the additions were church bells in 1927, an icon screen in the late 1930s and stained-glass windows in 1945.



By 1947, the congregation had grown from 150 to 1,200 people. The church was so crowded during the two Sunday liturgies that a third Liturgy was added. Msgr. Michael A. Simodejka, the pastor,



encouraged the people to participate in fund-raising for a new church. By

1962, an adequate sum of money was saved and a nearby 14.6 acre tract of land was purchased. The new St. George Church, rectory and Educational Center were solemnly



dedicated during the parish's Golden Jubilee Year on October 29, 1967, by Rev. Msgr. Edward V. Rosack, Apostolic Administrator.

Framework of church





St. George's Church complex is dominated by the church itself which has 53-foot towers on either side of the arched front entrance. A corridor connects the Educational-Social Center to the church. In the Center are classrooms, a conference room, a large social hall, and lounges. A wooden iconostas was erected in memory of Msgr. Michael Simodejka

under the direction of Fr. Elias O'Brien. Upon completion, the Church was rededicated, and the new iconostas and holy table were blessed on May 4, 2003, by Archbishop Metropolitan Basil Schott. The remaining field and wooded area that borders the original property was purchased. Saint George's property now consists of 80 acres.
