

A Note from Fr. Christiaan

Dear Parishioners,

This has been an exciting week, despite the hiatus in pierogi production. Sixteen men stayed at your Seminary in Pittsburgh, all to bear the expense and drudgery of travel to discern entry into the Byzantine Catholic Seminary, which is ordinarily a five-year program of study. They stayed and prayed with our seminarians in hopes of figuring out what their future holds. Upon the heels of their departure from what is called a *Come and See* weekend, I am now going through applications of future seminarians who plan on starting their five-year program with us. We average about 10 priestly seminarians and 15 deacon candidates per year, a healthy number for a church that may be about 30,000 people.

The envelopes for the seminary that you see each year in your bundle might have felt disconnected from your daily church experience until, perhaps, Deacon Brian Norrell and his wife began staying at the Ambridge-St. Mary rectory a couple of years ago. Now *Fr.* Brian serves in our area as pastor in Avella, PA and Weirton, WV. His parishes are healthy, and he has quite an outreach to the university of Steubenville.

Hope is very present at the seminary too since we have many lay students who are getting Master's degrees, some of whom have a scholarship meant to train them to go back to their own Byzantine parishes and serve there. Our churches are small and our resources are limited, but good things are happening for our future. This May is a celebratory month for our seminary as we have our largest graduating class of 10 students (half of them deacons) receiving their Master's.

But what of Ambridge-Aliquippa, how does this connect to us? These men are all in the pool of future clergy for St. George's and St. Mary's. The generations of American clergy that I've had the privilege of training over 12 years have inspired confidence in me over the years. Dedicated, prayerful, and – yes – even practical servants have issued from our training ground. I am humbled to see how they are willing to sacrifice much, be evaluated and critique for four years, only in order to serve Byzantine Catholics. You'll be seeing future announcements of more ordinations this summer!

As for our parishes and me, it's becoming obvious, I hope, that I am getting to know and to enjoy you more each week. I felt much more connected with everybody after joining you for our Paschal celebrations, St. George's festival, and – naturally – by our fun interactions at the pierogi factories. I also keep feeling grateful that I am given parishes where Fr. Geoff had either inherited or cultivated supportive volunteers who have really made it enjoyable to be here. Perhaps, as some claim, there is a honeymoon period of 6 months (priestly lore, perhaps applied to other venues too), but I'm not convinced after 25 years of service in the church that this is some sort of inexorable law of the universe. I am seeing a culture of service at our churches. So far, for me, the striking of a balance has felt possible because of your support. I certainly would feel happy to stay with you as long as the archbishop allows me to be here... Next week, my final pierogi experience will not go undocumented, so stay tuned!

Fifth Paschal Sunday

Simplicity of faith argues with crafty unbelief. Faith, coming to the blind man who received sight, enlightened his mind's eyes, and he clearly saw the truth. See how everything was logical for him. They ask him: "What do you say of Him who gave you sight?" "He is a prophet," he answered, that is, the messenger of God, clothed in miracle-working power. An indisputably true conclusion! But learned erudition does not want to see this trueness and seeks to evade its consequences. However, this being impossible, it approaches unlearned simplicity with the suggestion: Give God the praise, we know that this man is a sinner. Simplicity of faith does not know how to connect these concepts — sinfulness and miracle-working - and expresses this



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openly: "Whether he be a sinner or not, I don't know; one thing I know, that, whereas I was blind, now I see." What can one say against such deduction? But the logic of the unbelievers is obstinate, and even in the face of obviousness it is not ashamed to affirm that it does not know where he who opened the blind man's eyes is from. "Herein is a marvellous thing," the sensible logic of faith says to them, "that ye know not from whence He is, and yet He hath opened mine eyes. Now we know that God hears not sinners, but if any man be a worshipper of God, and does His will, him he hears. Since the world began was it not heard that any man opened the eyes of one that was born blind. If this man were not of God, He could do nothing" (John 9:17–33). It would seem as though after this nothing remained other than to bow down before the power of such a conclusion. But learned erudition could not stand the sensible logic of faith, and drove it away... Go now, prove the truth of the faith to those whose mind has been corrupted with obstinate unbelief. The unbelievers of all times are cut from the same cloth.

St. Theophan the Recluse

Touched by Divine Light

St. Ambrose of Milan teaches that the blind man touched by Jesus received more than just his sight. In one instant we see both the power of his divinity and the strength of his holiness. As the divine light, he touched this man and enlightened him. As priest, by an action symbolizing baptism he wrought in him his work of redemption. The only reason for his mixing clay with the saliva and smearing it on the eyes of the blind man was to remind you that he who restored the man to health by anointing his eyes with clay is the very one who fashioned the first man out of clay, and that this clay that is our flesh can receive the light of eternal life through the sacrament of baptism. You, too, should come to Siloam, that is, to him who was sent by the Father, as he says in the Gospel: "My teaching is not my own; it comes from him who sent me." Let Christ wash you, and then you will see.

The Ascension of Our Lord

On the fortieth day after His Passover, Jesus ascended into heaven to be glorified with God the Father, Who had sent Him into the world to accomplish the work the Father gave Him to do. In the Ascension resides the meaning and fullness of Christ's Resurrection.

Having destroyed the power of death, the Lord now leaves us in order to glorify us with Himself, to "prepare a place" for us and to take us into the blessedness of God's presence in the "heavenly sanctuary ... the Holy Place not made by hands". He goes in order to send the Holy



Spirit to bear witness to Him and His gospel in the world, making Him powerfully present in the lives of disciples.

Christian Greeting During Ascensiontide

Throughout Ascensiontide, we are called upon to proclaim the sublime reality that following the Ascension event with this Christian greeting, "Christ is glorified!" As we joyously render the response to this festive greeting, we affirm to all people everywhere that we must "Exalt Him forever!"

The Leave-taking of Pascha

After Wednesday's end, we cease chanting the Paschal hymns. The canon, the stichera, even the ubiquitous tropar: Christ is Risen... all come to an end. It is the last day to rejoice in the pure Paschal joy in the presence of the Risen Lord before his Ascension. For the next nine days there is a kind of silence hovering over the Church's liturgy. There is still a certain Paschal joy and expectation for Pentecost; for example, we still do not kneel...but there is an air of waiting, of not quite full Paschal joy...

But for today, sing your heart out! It is the last chance till next year.


