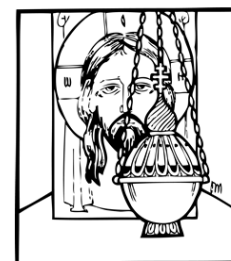

October 26 is **Carpatho-Rusyn Day** in North America. The Carpatho-Rusyn Consortium of North America, a coalition of six cultural organizations representing the Rusyn people, designated October 26 as Carpatho-Rusyn Day in the United States and Canada. October 26 was chosen to commemorate a gathering at Independence Hall in Philadelphia in 1918, at which Carpatho-Rusyns were recognized for the first time as a distinct nationality by the members of the Mid-European Union as well as the U.S. government.

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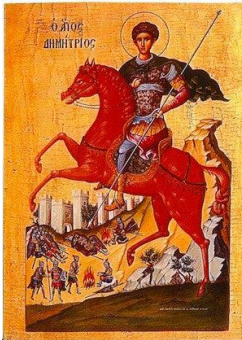

The Holy & Glorious Demetrius of Thessalonica, October 26

The Holy Great Martyr Demetrius of Thessalonica was the son of a Roman proconsul in Thessalonica. Three centuries had elapsed and Roman paganism, spiritually shattered and defeated by the multitude of martyrs and confessors of the Savior, intensified its persecutions. The parents of St Demetrius were secretly Christians, and he was baptized and raised in the Christian Faith in a secret church in his father’s home.



By the time Demetrius had reached maturity and his father had died, the emperor Galerius Maximian had ascended the throne (305). Maximian, confident in Demetrius’ education as well as his administrative and military abilities, appointed him to his father’s position as proconsul of the Thessalonica district. The main tasks of this young commander were to defend the city from barbarians and to eradicate Christianity. The emperor’s policy regarding Christians was expressed simply, “Put to death anyone who calls on the name of Christ.” The emperor did not suspect that by appointing Demetrius he had provided a way for him to lead many people to Christ. Accepting the appointment, Demetrius returned to Thessalonica and immediately confessed and glorified our Lord Jesus Christ. Instead of persecuting and executing Christians, he began to teach the Christian Faith openly to the inhabitants of the city and to overthrow pagan customs and idolatry.

The compiler of his Life, St Simeon Metaphrastes, says that because of his teaching zeal he became “a second Apostle Paul” for Thessalonica, particularly since “the Apostle to the Gentiles” once founded at this city the first community of believers (1 Thess. and 2 Thess.).

The Lord also destined St Demetrius to follow the holy Apostle Paul as a martyr...” He began to pray and fast, preparing himself for martyrdom. When the emperor came into the city, he summoned Demetrius, who boldly confessed himself a Christian and denounced the falsehood and futility of Roman polytheism. Maximian gave orders to lock up the confessor in prison. At dawn on October 26, 306, soldiers appeared in the saint’s underground prison and ran him through with lances. The body of the holy Great Martyr Demetrius was cast out for wild animals to devour, but the Christians took it and secretly buried it in the earth.

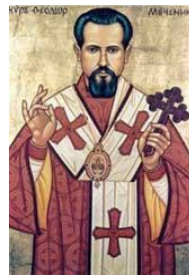

Blessed Theodore Romzha

On October 31 we commemorate Blessed Theodore Romzha in our Byzantine Catholic Church. *"I would rather die than betray my Church,"* Blessed Theodore Romzha (1911-1947), told his Soviet Communist persecutors. The apostolic administrator of the Ruthenian Catholic Mukachevo Eparchy in Ukraine, Bishop Romzha told his flock, *"Faith is our greatest treasure on this earth."* The NKVD secret police soon poisoned him.



Are you alive in Christ?

The Lord compared the priests of the people with him who was clothed in purple. Nothing is more honored than purple clothing. He compared the disciples of the cross with Lazarus. There were none more lowly than Lazarus was. He revealed the names of his beloved ones through Lazarus, his beloved one. He also wished to reveal the name of his enemies through the words, "If they do not listen to Moses and the prophets." It is not the case that all those living are alive, or that all those buried are dead.

Twentieth Sunday after Pentecost

On this Sunday again we hear a very familiar parable about the Rich Man and the poor man named Lazarus. From this Gospel reading we learn that if we give our love to money and to the things of the world that it buys and not to God, we suffer, we are committing sin, because we are choosing to live against God and against the principle of our nature. The reason it is "sinful" to love money and the things it can buy is because it goes against the law of our nature. The law of our nature is to love God in whom we were made. Only when we love God are we truly healthy, whole and alive. When we give our love to money and to the lusts of the flesh that money can buy, we give our love to that which has no life, to what passes away. We are then giving our love to death. This is why we are sick in soul and body. In our love for money, we have become disconnected from ourselves, disjointed, and fragmented.



The Rich Man in this morning's parable represents anyone who loves money and the things of the world it can buy. Perhaps the Rich man in this morning's Gospel represents especially us who call ourselves Christian. We say we love God with our lips; but what do we love in our secret heart? Outwardly, we attend the Divine Services. Outwardly, we say our prayers. We may even say them regularly, faithfully. But in our heart, who, what do we love?

According to this parable of Lazarus and the Rich Man, the chief distinguishing mark of the lover of money is indifference to his neighbor in need. Engrossed in the endless chase to get ahead, he is in total disregard to the suffering and the needs of others. On this Sunday let us renew the vision of the Gospel that the Church through her prophets, her preachers and teachers, cries out to all of us: "In the fear of God, with faith and love draw near." Turn away from the love of money and from the lusts of the flesh, the lust of the eyes and the pride of life; for these are not of the Father but they are of the world, and the world passes away, and the lust of it, but he who does the will of God abides forever. Serve God as your only Master. To take up your cross is to take up the work of learning to love Him with all your heart and your neighbor, even your enemy, the suffering and the needy as yourself; and so you may live and go in and take possession of the land, the Kingdom of Heaven, that the Lord, the God of our fathers, has given to you. Amen

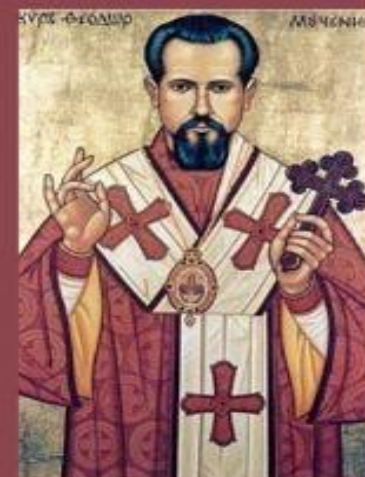
