
Rejoice! You are free!

Jesus' First Disciples

The next day John was there again with two of his disciples. When he saw Jesus passing by, he said, "Look, the Lamb of God!" When the two disciples heard him say this, they followed Jesus. Turning around, Jesus saw them following and asked, "What do you want?" They said, "Rabbi" (which means Teacher), "where are you staying?"

"Come," he replied, "and you will see."

So, they went and saw where he was staying and spent that day with him. It was about the tenth hour. Andrew, Simon Peter's brother, was

one of the two who heard what John had said and who had followed Jesus. The first thing Andrew did was to find his brother Simon and tell him, "We have found the Messiah" (that is, the Christ). And he brought him to Jesus. (*John 1:35*)

St. Andrew in Tradition

After the Descent of the Holy Spirit upon the Apostles, St. Andrew went to the Eastern lands preaching the Word of God. He went through Asia Minor, Thrace, Macedonia, and Ukraine. He stopped overnight on the hills of Kyiv. Rising in the morning, he said to those disciples that were with him: "See these hills? Upon these hills shall shine forth the beneficence of God, and there will be a great city here, and God shall raise up many churches." The apostle went up around the hills, blessed them and set up a cross. He also went to Thrace, where in the small village of Byzantium, the future Constantinople, he founded the Church of Christ. On his journeys the First-Called Apostle endured many sufferings and torments from pagans, but through the prayers of the Apostle, the Lord worked many miracles.

Preparing to Receive the King of Glory

If the Twelve Days of Christmas (originally the days between the birth of Christ and Epiphany) has been given to us in order to celebrate the birth of Christ, then the forty days of Advent that come before it is meant to prepare us to celebrate properly. Think of it this way, if it was announced that a king was coming to your house for dinner in a month's time, wouldn't you begin right away with all of the preparations to receive such a guest? And wouldn't you even complain that one month was not enough time to do all that would need to be done? Well, on Christmas, in a spiritual manner of speaking, we will be receiving a king – the King of



Glory. How much more should we prepare the room of our heart to receive the Master of All? This is what Advent is: a time to prepare the "cave" or "manger" of our heart to receive the Savior. To do this we abstain from certain foods, while increasing our prayer life and almsgiving – not because God needs it – but because we do! These practices are pleasing to God, when they are done in His Name, and collectively they purify our hearts of self-centeredness, pride, and all the other things that separate us from Him. May the King of Glory, the Second Person of the Holy Trinity and Son of God, make each of us worthy to receive Him into our heart and celebrate His birth in a manner that is worthy of His Glory. Monday, December 8th is the Maternity of Anna. Due to the cramped schedule the only liturgy will be 6:00pm Monday evening at St. Mary's. I will take Tuesday as my day off.

The Theotokos of Guadalupe is Friday, December 12th. We will have 5:00pm Great Vespers with Litija and 6:00pm Divine Liturgy at St. George on Thursday, December 11th. Friday, December 12th, there will be a 6:00pm Divine Liturgy followed by a fiesta. Although originally advertised for the hall, it will most likely be held in the rectory due to the pirohy sale earlier in the day.

Twenty Sixth Sunday after Pentecost

Today, the Church presents for our consideration the image of the woman who was bent over and unable to stand up because of the evil spirits that afflicted her. As the Fathers of the Church explain, this woman is a symbol of our human nature oppressed by a sinful life – the life of vice and of sin. As Saint Athanasios explained in his great work On the Incarnation, man having "rejected the contemplation of God" was weighed down by sin and unable to lift up his eyes to contemplate heavenly realities. It is for this reason, Saint Athanasios explained, that God became man and was born in a manger—that we who were bent over like the animals and feeding ourselves on earthly things might meet God face to face in the feed trough of the manger and be raised in him and returned to our proper stature to



contemplate the things above. The following is the most famous part of his explanation:


"Seeing that men, having rejected the contemplation of God, and with their eyes downward, as though sunk in the deep, were seeking about for God in nature and in the world of sense, feigning gods for themselves of mortal men and demons; to this end the loving and general Savior of all, the Word of God, takes to Himself a body, and as Man walks among men and meets the senses of all men half-way, to the end, I say, that they who think that God is corporeal may from what the Lord effects by His body perceive the truth, and through Him recognize the Father. So, men as they were, and human in all their thoughts, on whatever objects they fixed their senses, there they saw themselves met half-way, and taught the truth from every side. For if they looked with awe upon the Creation, yet they saw how she confessed Christ as Lord; or if their mind was swayed toward men, so as to think them gods, yet from the Savior's works, supposing they compared them, the Savior alone among men appeared Son of God; for there were no such works done among the rest as have been done by the Word of God. Or if they were biased toward evil spirits, even, yet seeing them cast out by the Word, they were to know that He alone, the Word of God, was God, and that the spirits were none. Or if their mind had already sunk even to the dead, so as to worship heroes, and the gods spoken of in the poets, yet, seeing the Savior's resurrection, they were to confess them to be false gods, and that the Lord alone is true, the Word of the Father, that was Lord even of death. For this cause He was both born and appeared as Man, and died, and rose again, dulling and casting into the shade the works of all former men by His own, that in whatever direction the bias of men might be, from thence He might recall them, and teach them of His own true Father, as He Himself says: "I came to save and to find that which was lost." (Lk 19.10). (Inc. 15)


