

WHO ARE WE?

The Catholic Church is a communion of churches. It is made up of churches from the Eastern Tradition and the Western Tradition. Eastern Catholics are in union with Rome. We share the same basic faith and the same mysteries (sacraments), however, our way of expressing them follows the same tradition as the Orthodox churches. In reality, there are many Eastern churches, each with its own heritage and theology, liturgy and discipline.

Jesus sent his disciples to the four corners of the world to spread the Gospel. Eventually, four great centers of Christianity emerged with distinctive Christian customs, but the same faith. These centers were Jerusalem, Antioch, Rome and Alexandria. A few centuries later when the capital of the Roman Empire was moved to the Eastern city of Byzantium, later renamed Constantinople, an adaptation of the Antioch celebration of the liturgy was made.

From this powerful cultural center the Byzantine church emerged.

A Brief Explanation of the Eastern Catholic Churches, Introduction)

Thus the Byzantine Catholic Church is an Eastern Church in union with Rome; Carpatho-Rusyn in background and flavor, but indeed an American Eastern Church celebrating the Gospel in words, symbols, and action. We are unique in our mystical theology, blending the colors of our many ikons with the congregational acapella chants; raising up our hands and our fragrant incense in prayer and inviting you to come and see who we are and what we are all about as part of the Eastern half of the Universal Church.

We are taking donations throughout the year for our annual Flea Market. Any time you have an item to donate, please leave it in the Center. FYI: Donations will not be stored in the Center, merely dropped off to be moved to the Flea Market storage area immediately. That was always the plan. Flea Market donations will not "pile up" in the Center as some have thought.

*HRAMOTY: This venerable custom was transmitted to us by our ancestors as a part of our beautiful spiritual heritage. Every year, just before Meat-Fare Saturday, the families give the lists of their departed loved ones (Hramoty) to the pastor with the request that they be mentioned at the services held for the deceased on the All Souls Saturday. And St. John Chrysostom assures us that: "It is a great honor to be worthy of mention, while the celebration of the Holy Mysteries is going on." (Homily on the Acts 21, 4) Members of the family are encouraged to attend these services on the All Souls Saturdays for by their presence and by their personal prayers and receiving Holy Communion they strengthen the bond of love with their departed loved ones and indeed keep their memory everlasting!

Amongst your offertory envelopes you have an envelope for the commemoration of departed souls marked "All Soul's Saturdays Remembrance". Please write the names of your deceased loved ones on this envelope and drop the envelope in the collection basket.

Sunday of the Prodigal Son

The parable of the Prodigal Son speaks of many things including the terrible corrupting effects of sin, the unconditional love of God and the hard work and joy of REPENTANCE. Can repentance be joyful?

Repentance is much more than making a list and admitting our sins. It implies the willingness to make a radical transformation. Metanoia-μετάνοια, the Greek word for repentance, literally means to turn around, to change one's mind or direction.

Repentance cannot be merely a recognizing sin in our lives. We must also change the way we think about ourselves, about God, about life itself. The Prodigal Son



came to believe he was invincible. Notice, he did not change his mind on his own. Running out of money and into debt changed it for him, but a real transformation began in him when he realized the way to end his suffering: to return home. Facing the consequences at home, he reasoned, would be far better than continuing life in a pigpen. He changed his mind. He accepted that he was not invincible. I'll bet at some point he attempted to blame his father for his ill fortune while he ate those pods. Do we not usually look for someone else to blame when things don't go right? Eventually he came to know the truth. He came to understand that no one else was to blame. His understanding of himself changed at that moment. He came face to face with reality, with his stupid decision and irresponsible behavior. He stood and walked away not only from a pigpen, but from a lie.

If we want to make progress during this upcoming Great Fast-Lent we too must turn away from the lies around which we have built our lives. That is why the Church asks us to begin the Lenten journey by first seeking one another's forgiveness and giving it in the great ritual of Forgiveness Vespers. We must take responsibility for our actions and forgive any who have wronged us. Then we are instructed through one of the Church's holy prayers "to still all earthly and material thoughts." On this Sunday, together with the Prodigal Son let us also embrace the idea of repentance as embracing a new way of seeing and living life. Amen

Meatfare Sunday

Next Sunday, February 24, *The Sunday of the Last Judgment*, marks the mid-point of our preparation of the Great Fast. It was traditionally called Meatfare Sunday because it was the last day meat was eaten until Pascha. Though this strict monastic observance has been relaxed in recent years, many keep this practice today. Whether we keep the original observance or abstain from meat on Wednesdays and Fridays, we still have this day to ease into the Great Fast, where we will fast, spend more time in prayer, make a sincere effort to attend Lenten services during the week, and grow closer to God in anticipation of Pascha.

St. Kosmos: Hatred is the Devil's Poison

Even if we perform upon thousands of good works, my brethren: fasts, prayers, almsgiving; even if we shed our blood for our Christ and we don't have these two loves [love of God and love of brethren], but on the contrary have hatred and malice toward our brethren, all the good we have done is of the devil and we go to hell. But, you say, we go to hell despite all the good we do because of that little hatred?

Yes, my brethren, because that hatred is the devil's poison, and just as when we put a little yeast in a hundred pounds of flour it has such power that it causes all the dough to rise, so it is with hatred. It transforms all the good we have done into the devil's poison.

On Helping to Quench Anger

A man who is wrathful with us is a sick man; we must apply a plaster to his heart - love; we must treat him kindly, speak to him gently, lovingly. And if there is not deeply-rooted malice against us within him, but only a temporary fit of anger, you will see how his heart, or his malice, will melt away through your kindness and love - how good will conquer evil. A Christian must always be kind, gracious, and wise in order to conquer evil by good.
