A Note from Fr. Geoff...

Dear Sisters and Brothers,

This past week, I began reading Charles Dickens' original *A Christmas Carol* to my children. In the famous scene in which two men, representing a charity fund, visit Mr. Scrooge, they explain to him,

"At this festive season of the year, Mr. Scrooge," said the gentleman, taking up a pen, "it is more than usually desirable that we should make some slight provision for the Poor and Destitute, who suffer greatly at the present time. Many thousands are in want of common necessaries; hundreds of thousands are in want of common comforts, sir."

Of course, Mr. Scrooge's reaction is well known: he gives them nothing at all for the needs of the poor and destitute.

We followers of Christ, however, know that the way of God is the way of charity. Christ himself the *Philanthropos*, the "lover of mankind," - from which we get the word philanthropy.

The final weeks of the year, as "Christmas spirit" is in the air, are a good time to consider the needs of those who are less fortunate: the poor, the homeless, the unemployed, the destitute, the aged, the unwanted, the prisoner, the abused, those in war-torn places, the addicted, those in unloving homes.

It is heartening to think of all of the organizations and agencies in our area that meet some of these needs. It is worth looking into them to see how we can help, whether by giving of our time, our talents, or our "treasures." Organizations like Uncommon Grounds (Aliquippa), the Center for Hope (Ambridge), Faith Restorations (Monaca), Choices Pregnancy Services (Coraopolis), and Catholic Charities (Beaver) and many others do amazing and important work inspired by and in keeping with the Gospel of Jesus Christ.

Let us keep all of these organizations, and others like them, in our prayers. Let us also ask our Lord how he might be leading *us*, both individually and corporately, to reach out in love to those in need around us.

And let us remember, too, that our support of such charities is not something to simply be done in December in the "Christmas spirit" so that we can pat ourselves on the back. We must seek to make our commitment to caring for the least, the last, and the lost a part of our whole lives, the whole year long.

For our Lord himself said, "Just as you did it to one of the least of these, my brothers and sisters, you did it to me." (Matthew 25.40) And we can be merciful and compassionate because Christ first showed mercy and compassion to us.

CONFESSION for Christmas - The Nativity Fast (Advent) is a season of penitence and fasting. To better prepare for the coming of the Nativity of our Lord (Christmas) the faithful are encouraged to make an examination of conscience and, if appropriate, to make a confession of their sins to a priest. Because Fr. Geoff serves two parishes, it is not always convenient to hear confessions before Liturgy (though he will *always* make time for confession when requested!).

This week (Nov. 30/Dec. 1) and next week (Dec 7/8), Fr. Geoff will remain after each Liturgy at both St. Mary's and St. George's, so that the faithful can avail themselves of this Sacramental Mystery. If these times are not convenient for you, you may speak with him and he will be happy to arrange another time.

Excerpt from Christ Our Pascha - The Consequences of the Fall. With the question, "Adam, where are you?" (Gn 3:9), the Lord God stirs humankind to repentance through the voice of conscience. However, Adam does not repent, but gives excuses, trying to avoid personal responsibility: "The woman whom you gave to be with me, she gave me fruit of the tree, and I ate" (Gn 3:12). In a similar way Eve also makes excuses: "The serpent tricked me, and I ate" (Gn 3:13). (#153)

<u>The Theotokos of Guadalupe, Patroness of the Americas</u> - The Theotokos of Guadalupe, who first appeared on Dec. 9, 1531 in Mexico to St. Juan Diego, bestowing on him an icon "not made with human hands," requesting that a church be built in her honor on that mountain. Her shrine there is one of the most celebrated places of pilgrimage in the Americas. Pope John Paul II named her the Patroness of the Americas.

Preparing to Receive the King of Glory

In this season of Advent, which is our preparation before the Feast of the Nativity of Christ, it is helpful for us to take the time to consider what we are truly preparing to celebrate in the first place. So what do we know about this Child and the reason for His coming into the world? This Child is the Son and Word of God — the very same Word of God Who was revealed in the Old Testament. This is the same Divine Logos Who appeared to Moses in the burning bush, and who wrestled with Jacob. This Second Person of the Holy Trinity was revealed in the Old Testament without flesh, without human nature; He appeared sometimes as an angel and other times as fire.



He Who's voice was heard by the righteous prophets now comes to earth, clothed in flesh. This child is the very same God; the very same Divine Logos Who is begotten of the Father before all time. There never was a time when He did not exist, but He was always with the Father, eternally begotten of Him and sharing His one essence, together with the Holy Spirit. This Child that we are preparing to behold – so defenseless, and so dependent on others to care for Him – is the same Person Who was transfigured in Divine glory on Mt Tabor. When we speak of "the baby Jesus," This is Who we are referring to: The eternal and divine Logos of God, and it is His birth into this world that we will celebrate on Christmas.

If the Twelve Days of Christmas (originally the days between the birth of Christ and Epiphany) has been given to us in order to celebrate the birth of Christ, then the forty days of Advent that come before it are meant to prepare us to celebrate properly. Think of it this way, if it was announced that a king was coming to your house for dinner in a month's time, wouldn't you begin right away with all of the preparations to receive such a guest? And wouldn't you even complain that one month was not enough time to do all that would need to be done? Well, on Christmas, in a spiritual manner of speaking, we will be receiving a king – the King of Glory. How much more should we prepare the room of our heart to receive the Master of All? This is what Advent is: a time to prepare the "cave" or "manger" of our heart to receive the Savior. To do this we abstain from certain foods, while increasing our prayer life and almsgiving – not because God needs it – but because we do! These practices are pleasing to God, when they are done in His Name, and collectively they purify our hearts of self-centeredness, pride, and all the other things that separate us from Him. So I wish you all a good and profitable Advent! May the King of Glory, the Second Person of the Holy Trinity and Son of God, make each of us worthy to receive Him into our heart and celebrate His birth in a manner that is worthy of His Glory. Amen.
