This feast day concludes the celebration of the Nativity and with the offerings of the Virgin Mother and the prophecy of Simeon, the events now point toward Easter.



Candles in our Holy Church - For the Feast of the Encounter-Meeting of Our Lord (Feb. 2) it is a pious and venerable tradition in our Holy Church to bless candles. It is impossible to imagine an Eastern Church without burning candles. Candles made of beeswax are used in our Holy Church as a form of sacrifice and devotion to God or Saints. They are used in various Divine Services and ceremonies and are symbolic of Christ, who is "the Light of the World." When we see so many candles everywhere, we know that Christ is everywhere in the whole church, our homes, and He is in us, too. According to a different symbolism, the two elements of a candle represent the two natures of Christ: the Divine (the burning wick) and

the Human (the wax body).

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I was Lost but Now I am Found

As we draw closer to the Great Fast, today we hear the parable of the Prodigal Son. Hearing Christ's parable about God's loving forgiveness, we are called to "come to ourselves" as did the prodigal son, to see ourselves in a "far country" far from the Father's house, and to make the movement of return to God. We are given every assurance by the Master that the Father will receive us with joy and gladness. We must only "arise and go", confessing our self-inflicted and sinful separation from that "home" where we truly belong.

Sunday of the Prodigal Son

I have recklessly forgotten Your glory, O Father; and among sinners I have scattered the riches which You had given me. Therefore, I cry to You like the Prodigal: "I have sinned before You, O compassionate Father; receive me a penitent and make me as one of Your hired servants."

On the third Sunday of preparation for Lent, we hear the parable of the Prodigal Son (Luke 15:11-32). Together with the hymns on this day, the parable reveals to us the time of repentance as man's return from exile. The



prodigal son, we are told, went to a far country and there spent all that he had. A far country! It is this unique definition of our human condition that we must assume and make ours as we begin our approach to God. A man who has never had that experience, be it only very briefly, who has never felt that he is exiled from God and from real life, will never understand what Christianity is about. And the one who is perfectly "at home" in this world and its life, who has never been wounded by the nostalgic desire for another Reality, will not understand what repentance is.

Repentance is often simply identified as a cool and "objective" enumeration of sins and transgressions, as the act of "pleading guilty" to a legal indictment. Confession and absolution are seen as being of a juridical nature. But something very essential is overlooked - without which neither confession nor absolution have any real meaning or power. This "something" is precisely the feeling of alienation from God, from the joy of communion with Him, from the real life as created and given by God. It is easy indeed to confess that I have not fasted on prescribed days, or missed my prayers, or become angry. It is quite a different thing, however, to realize suddenly that I have defiled and lost my spiritual beauty, that I am far away from my real home, my real life, and that something precious and pure and beautiful has been hopelessly broken in the very texture of my existence. Yet this, and only this, is repentance, and therefore it is also a deep desire to return, to go back, to recover that lost home....

ECF Reflection, Sunday of the Prodigal Son "You are not your own."

"Independence" is one of the great "rights" of man that is held to be sacred and inviolable for Americans. The Epistle proclaimed in the Church today, however, challenges our modern notion of independence when it proclaims St. Paul's teaching that we were "purchased with a price" and that we are not our own, but we belong to the Lord.

On the day of our baptism, each one of us was incorporated into the Church and made members of Christ's body, and sharers of His eternal life. Just as the parts of the body are interdependent, and ultimately totally dependent on the soul and spirit for life, so it is for Christ and the members of His Church. Each of us derives our spiritual life from Christ and receives that life through other members of the body of the Church. As such, none of us is "independent," but rather we are totally dependent upon one another, and all of us are dependent on Christ.

From the important Biblical concept of spiritual dependence, we can understand the need for us to live a life in conformity with Him from whom we received it, and on whom we depend for everything.

Applying the parable of the prodigal son to the above explanation helps this truth take flesh in our imagination and allows us those we teach to better understand what life is like away from our source of life, and what it is like to return in our hearts to our King and or God.

Get up and Run

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Christ chooses those who stand. **Rise and run to the Church**. Here is the Father, the Son and the Holy Spirit. He who hears you pondering in the secret places of the mind runs to you. When you are still far away, He sees you and runs to you. He sees in your heart, He runs, perhaps someone may hinder and He embraces you. His foreknowledge is in the running, his mercy in the embrace and the disposition of fatherly love. He falls on your neck to raise you when you are prostrate and burned with sins. He brings you back when you have turned from the earth to heaven. Christ falls on your neck to free your neck from the yoke of slavery and He hangs his sweet yoke upon your shoulders. (*St. Ambrose*)
