

A Note from Father Geoff

Dear Brothers and Sisters,

In the Epistle for this morning, St. Paul is writing to the young church gathered in Rome. Although St. Paul was an itinerant Apostle, he had not yet been to the great City of Rome and when he finally would get there (after his Letter was written), it would be to meet his martyrdom.

But although he had not yet visited the Christians in Rome, he knew of them by reputation. Just two verses before our reading this morning starts, he says, "I thank my God through Jesus Christ for all of you, because your faith is proclaimed throughout the world." (Rom. 1.8) Then our reading describes St. Paul's great desire to join them and be in fellowship with them.

He writes, "For I am longing to see you so that I may share with you some spiritual gift to strengthen you -- or rather so that we may be mutually encouraged by each other's faith, both *yours and mine.*" (Rom. 1.11-12)

What a beautiful image of Christian faithfulness lived in fellowship. To be mutually encouraged by each other's faith is what we are all called to do. In another of St. Paul's letters, he put it this way: "Encourage one another and build each other up." (1 Thess. 5.11)

And in Philippians he says, "Let each of you look not to your own interests, but to the interests of others." (Phil. 2.4) He then links this behavior explicitly to the way that Christ has behaved toward us. (I encourage you to read all of Philippians chapter 2. It is edifying!)

Brothers and sisters, I am gratified to see our parish at its best when we build each other up and seek the good of one another. "Behold how good and pleasant it is when brothers and sisters dwell together in unity," as the Psalmist put it. (Ps. 132) Let us continue to ask the grace of God to be servants to one another and build each other up.

May the divine humility of Christ so transform our hearts and our minds - and indeed our whole parish - that the world may see us and know that we are truly Christians, truly disciples of Jesus, by our love. (John 13.35)

Second Sunday after Pentecost Reflection

In his letter to the church in Rome, St. Paul teaches that God will bestow His blessings upon the Jews who do good works and fulfill the Law of Moses. For St. Paul, those who do not know the Law and have never heard the Commandments will be rewarded according to how they follow their conscience. The Gentiles fulfill the law according to natural reasoning by following their conscience. God's will is written into the human heart, speaking to us through our conscience and reason. Both Jews and gentiles (the non-Jews) can taste Paradise. For us Christians, who know the



Gospel and have heard the Lord's call to turn away from sin, to love God and our neighbor, our burden is twofold. We must be obedient to the word of God as well as to our conscience and reason. Through harmony between our conscience, the Lord's commands, and our words and actions, God will bestow upon us his glory, honor, and peace.

We are not meant to hear the Gospel with our ears only, but to hear with faith and obedience. With faith and obedience, Jesus calls us to follow him with our whole lives. The Gospel presents the faith and obedience of these four Apostles when they are first called. They have a difficult but pleasant life, fishing on the Sea of Galilee with their family and friends. But, Jesus calls them to leave their old life behind, to come and follow Him. They trust that the Lord will lead them to a better life. And so, by faith, they leave everything behind and immediately follow. When they leave their nets and boat, they leave trusting the Lord, but not knowing what lies ahead. They do not know, at the time, that they will be filled with wisdom and the Holy Spirit and that their lives will be an offering for the Salvation of the whole world. If the Lord is calling us to follow Him, to leave behind our old life, we may not see where we will end up. But, through faith today and hope for tomorrow, we too can leave our nets behind and follow the Lord Jesus Christ. If we follow His call, we will have life in abundance, beyond anything we could achieve on our own.

CHALLENGE QUESTIONS:

- 1. How is God calling you to "come follow" Him in your life?
- 2. What "nets and vessel" must you leave behind to be obedient to God's call in your life?
- 3. What keeps you from following the Lord? Is it worth it?

The Fathers on Scripture: But note, both their faith and their obedience. For though they were in the midst of their work (and you know how time-consuming a chore fishing is), when they heard his command they did not delay or procrastinate. They did not say, "Let us return home and talk things over with our family." Instead, they "left everything behind" and followed," even as Elisha did when he followed Elijah. For Christ seeks this kind of obedience from us, such that we delay not even for a moment, though something absolutely most necessary should vehemently press in on us.

June Reflection
The Domestic Church

The Greek word for "church" is ekklesia meaning "to call out" or "to be called together." So, the "church" is the assembly of believers "called together," "called out" of unbelief, darkness, and sin into the presence of our Lord Jesus Christ. In particular, the church is "called together" through the Eucharist. The family or the "domestic church," is called together in the home and is a microcosm of the "church," a "mini-church." As Christ is present among us at every Divine Liturgy, so Christ is present among us in our homes every other day of the week.

What signs of the presence of Christ do we have in our homes, in the "domestic church?" First, selfless love, humility, and mutual submission for the good of one another is an essential sign of the Lord's presence among us. Second, physical signs of the presence of Christ in our homes allow us to remember that Christ is among us. Set aside a particular corner, in a room that the whole family frequently gathers, preferably a corner facing toward the East. Place in the corner a few icons: of Christ, the Theotokos and a patron saint of the family. The icons remind us of the presence of Christ, and all the saints, in our home. A candle, frequently lit for prayer (or if the family is attentive and full of care, an oil lamp often burning or always burning) is a sign of the light of Christ, the light of the commandments, shining within the heart of the family. Keep a Bible and prayer ropes, accessible and frequently used, to allow the family to grow spiritually in the home together. Third, Christ's presence is safeguarded by developing strict and consistent rules about television, video games, computers, and cell phones, according to the needs and zeal of the family. For example, leave televisions, laptops and cell phones out of bedrooms and limit their use to particular rooms in the house, to be used only at certain times. This will prevent the "domestic church" from fracturing into an assembly of isolated individuals. Finally, Christ is made present in sharing meals together each day, having begun each family meal with the appropriate prayers.

Our homes, our families called together, the Domestic Church, can and should be a mini "Garden of Eden," a mini Paradise, where our families walk together with God "in the cool of day" (Gen. 3:8), where we frequently remember together that Christ is present and dwelling among us.



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
