Update on COVID and Communion from Fr. Geoff

While the coronavirus continues to make some news, the reported numbers both across the country and in Pennsylvania are continuing to decline, for which we give thanks to Almighty God. Although we, as a parish, never enforced mask wearing, I did encourage folks to be careful and considerate of others. Now, with the new CDC and state health department guidance that came out last month, things are beginning to return to normal. This will mean some changes here in the parish. First, we will return to the traditional method of distributing Communion: one spoon to distribute the Holy Eucharist to all parishioners. Second, we will be removing the ropes which were intended to keep folks socially distanced. We will not be enforcing social distancing. However, please be sensitive to any fellow parishioners who wish to continue to do so. Lastly, I continue to encourage those who are unvaccinated to wear masks. Whatever you decide to do or not to do, let us show Christian charity and consideration to each other. Many thanks for all of your attention to COVID protocols over the past year. May God bless, keep, and preserve us all for his glory!



A Note from Father Geoff

Dear Sisters and Brothers,

In a famous passage of the Letter to the Galatians, St. Paul writes of the **''Fruit of the Spirit:''** *"But the fruit of the Spirit is love, joy, peace, patience, kindness, generosity, faithfulness, gentleness, and self-control."* (Gal. 5.22) These nine virtues are, for St. Paul, evidence that God is alive and active in us.

One of the ways we can do a self-examination is by considering these Fruit. Where in my life do I see the activity of the Holy Spirit that results in love? And in what ways have I fallen short? Am I a joyful Christian? Why or why not? How generous am I with my money, my time, or my attention? Where have I failed to be gentle? And other questions like these.

But the Fruit of the Spirit are not only virtues that we should try to cultivate. Many theologians and preachers will contrast the Fruit of the Spirit (Galatians 5.22) with the "Works of the Flesh" (Galatians 6.19-21). But I think it's important that we understand that "Fruit" is not just something we "bear", but also something we eat!

In order to bear the Fruit of the Spirit in our lives, we must have a steady diet of this Fruit. St. Paul contrasts this feast of fruit with what he calls "biting and devouring" *each other*. (see Galatians 5.13-15) Instead, we should partake of the Fruit of the Spirit!

And to partake of this Fruit is to partake of our Lord himself, who is the embodiment of the love of God (1 John 1.8). He is "our peace" (Ephesians 2.14). His patience is our salvation (2 Peter 3.15). And he is faithful, even when we fall short (2 Timothy 2:13).

Elsewhere, St. Paul writes, "Whatever is true, whatever is honorable, whatever is just, whatever is pure, whatever is pleasing, whatever is commendable, if there is any excellence and if there is anything worthy of praise, think on these things." (Philippians 4.8) Sisters and brothers, is there anything more commendable and honorable than these nine beautiful virtues we call the Fruit of the Spirit?

Let us pray that the Lord would continue to pour out his Spirit upon our parish - each and every member - that we would bear the Fruit of the Spirit in our lives and draw many others into the saving embrace of our Lord.

Before whining about the distance you drive Think of someone who walks the same distance with their feet. And when you are tired and complain about your job - Think of the unemployed, the disabled, and those who wish they had your job. And when depressing thoughts seem to get you down - Put a smile on your face and think: you're alive and still around.


Third Sunday after Pentecost Reflection

Therefore I tell you, do not be anxious about your life, what you shall eat or what you shall drink, nor about your body, what you shall put on. Is not life more than food and the body more than clothing? Look at the birds of the air: they neither sow nor reap nor gather into barns, and yet your heavenly Father feeds them. Are you not of more value than they?

Today's Scripture readings speak of faith, which is "the substance of things hoped for, the evidence of things not seen" (Hebrews 11:1). The Epistle tells us, "now that we have been justified through faith, let us have peace with God." In today's world we desperately need peace: All over the world, and especially in our country, we see civil unrest, riots, disease, injustice, and death. Yet Saint Paul says that we Christians

"exult in tribulations." That's not to say that we are glad these terrible things are happening, but we rejoice because through them God works good: "tribulation produces endurance, and endurance challenge, and challenge hope, and hope does not deceive, for God's love is poured forth in our hearts through the Holy Spirit, who has been given to us." By suffering, God makes us stronger, better people. Though the gift of faith, we have hope, we can be sure of God's love for us, and that He has a plan. God is taking care of us, and St Paul explains why we can be sure of this, saying that, though we would be hesitant to give our lives even for righteous men, Jesus gave His life for us, even though we are sinners!

The Gospel reading continues this theme, comparing us to birds and the flowers. Jesus says "But if God so clothes the wild flower of the field, which today is alive and tomorrow is thrown into the oven, how much more you, O you of little faith! Therefore do not be anxious." Jesus is telling us to trust Him completely, not worrying about tomorrow. But this doesn't mean that we should do nothing. We should give ourselves over to God completely. In the last verse of today's gospel, Jesus says, "seek first the kingdom of God and His righteousness, and all these things shall be added to you." In other words, if we seek God in all things and at all times, and we strive to do His will and follow His commandments, then He will take care of us and make sure that we have what we need. Jesus tells us that, to do this, we must make sure our spiritual eyes are healthy. We need to pray often, and look at God, and not at the chaos and evil in the world around us, lest we forget Him. If we do this, as Saint Paul tells us, we will have peace. (But that doesn't mean we won't have trials and troubles, for trials and tribulations make us stronger!)



CHALLENGE QUESTIONS:

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1. Have there been times in my life, when I didn't trust God, and I thought everything relied on me? How did that work out?

2. Have there been times where I understood that God made something good and beautiful happen out of a tragedy or other bad situation? Has suffering ever made me stronger or helped me grow?

3. Jesus says "The lamp of the body is the eye. If your eye is sound, your whole body will be full of light." In what ways can I make sure that my spiritual eyes are healthy?

4. When I am going through rough times, and I am suffering, what can I do to remind myself that God has a plan, this is somehow part of it, and this is somehow good for me?

Trust in the Lord - Jesus teaches us to trust in God our Father at all times and in all circumstances. St John Chrysostom, in his commentary on Matthew, speaks to us about the meaning of the images used in this passage. Just when the lilies of the field are all decked out Jesus no longer calls them lilies but "grass of the field." He then points further to their vulnerable condition by saying "which are here today." Then He does not merely say "and not tomorrow" but rather more callously "cast into the oven". These creatures are not merely "clothed" but "so clothed" in this way as to be later brought to nothing. Do you see how Jesus everywhere abounds in amplifications and intensifications? He does so in order to press home his point. Then He adds, "Will he not much more clothe you?" The force of the emphasis is on "you" to indicate covertly how great is the value set upon your personal existence and the concern God shows for you in particular. It is as though He were saying, "You, to whom He gave a soul, for whom He fashioned a body, for whose sake He made everything in creation, for whose sake he gave up his only begotten Son." This is a powerful message.

For the Service of Love - All Christian prayer is for the service of love. The biggest gift from God is not the gift of prayer but the gift of love. Of love of those near and far away.

Someone said – am I praying right? We know we are praying right if we are growing in love, if we are becoming even a little more like the Lord, more loving, open, and joyful. Then prayer is right and you need not worry.

Prayer brings us close to the reality of Jesus – remembering we are worth more than anything around us, that each of us is created in the image of God. *Look around today at a field of flowers or birds in the air. Let Jesus' words echo: 'you are worth more than these'. Lord God, give me trust in your care for me, now and always.*
