

A Note from Father Geoff

Dear Brothers and Sisters,

This week, we celebrate the Exaltation of the Holy Cross. The readings for the Saturdays and Sundays before and after this observance are changed from the regular post-Pentecostal readings. So the whole week becomes, as it were, dedicated to the Holy Cross, which is the mystery of our salvation.

Throughout his ministry, Jesus gave hints about how he was going to die. A couple of times he referred to being " **lifted up**" from the earth. Obviously, this means he would be lifted up on the Cross, an instrument of torture and a means of state execution for traitors and insurrectionists. But the word used translated "lifted up" can also mean " **exalted**." So this cruel and shameful "lifting up" actually became the means of *exalting* the Lord; the Cross becomes a Throne.

Once, Jesus was arguing with the Pharisees about his identity. Jesus had claimed "I am the Light of the world." (John 8.12) In the interaction that followed, Jesus explained that he came from the Father, but the Pharisees did not know who his Father was. Then Jesus explained, "When you **lift up** the Son of Man, then you will know that I am he." (John 8.28) Jesus' true identity as the Messiah - the Christ who would save Israel and redeem the world - becomes clear only when he is lifted up/exalted on the Cross.

Later, when speaking to a crowd, Jesus would say, "Now is the time for the judgment of this world; now the prince of this world will be driven out. And I, when I am **lifted up** (*or "exalted"*) from the earth, will draw all people to myself." (John 12.31-32) These two sentences are rich with meaning:

First, on the Cross, Christ is judging the world. And he's judging the world by *taking to himself* the sin of the world. ("God made him who had no sin to be sin for us," as St. Paul put it in 2 Corinthians.) Second, it is by the power of the life-giving Cross that the "prince of this world" - the Evil One - is driven out. This is good news! The Enemy's defeat is guaranteed. We need not fear, for Christ is the Victor.

Finally, it is on the Cross that Jesus "draws all people" to himself. The message of the Cross, the message of redemption, the message of our salvation, is for *everyone*. God wants everyone to be saved and come to a knowledge of the truth. So he reaches out to all - and we, who take up our own crosses, reach out to all in his Name.

Lord Jesus Christ, you stretched out your arms of love on the hard wood of the Cross that everyone might come within the reach of your saving embrace. So clothe us in your Spirit, that we, reaching forth our hands in love, may bring those who do not know you to the knowledge and love of you, for the glory of your Name. Amen.

The Universal Exaltation of the Holy Cross: September 14

The Feast of the Exaltation of the Holy Cross originated in Jerusalem in the year 355 to commemorate the dedication of the Basilica of the Resurrection. When the true Cross of Jesus was found shortly afterwards, this event was commemorated on the same day. In time, the Feast of the Exaltation replaced the feast of the dedication.

In 395, St. John Chrysostom wrote of three crosses which were discovered beneath Golgotha by the Empress Helena. Many other writers speak of miracles which occurred through contact with the

true Cross. It was through one of these miracles that the true Cross was recognized by St. Helena and St. Macarius, the Bishop of Jerusalem.

The Holy Cross was kept in the Basilica of the Resurrection in Jerusalem until 614, when the Persians conquered the city and burned the Church. In 628, Emperor Heraclius III defeated the Persians and returned the Holy Cross to Jerusalem. A portion of the Cross was taken to Rome in the seventh century by Sergius I, a Pope of Byzantine origin.

As we celebrate this Major Feast let us remind ourselves that the power of the Cross is given to each and every Christian. But just as a soldier must learn to properly wield his weapons in battle, so a warrior of Christ must learn how correctly to make the sign of the Cross. A shield has no effect if carelessly waved about in the air. Likewise, there are many who receive no benefit from the sign of the Cross because they make it mechanically or haphazardly.

The Cross, once a tool of death, has become a means to life, an instrument of our salvation; it gives strength to resist temptation, to refrain from gossip or harsh words and it dispels fear. Amen.

Anniversary Liturgy - On Sunday, October 10th we will celebrate the tenth anniversary of Deacon Tom's ordination with a combined parishes Divine Liturgy at St. Mary in Ambridge at 9:30 AM. Deacon Gregory Loya from the Dormition of The Mother of God parish in Cleveland, Ohio will be concelebrating with Deacon Tom and will be the homilist for the Liturgy. Deacon Gregory and Deacon Tom were classmates at the Seminary from 2005 – 2010 during their academic studies for the diaconate.
