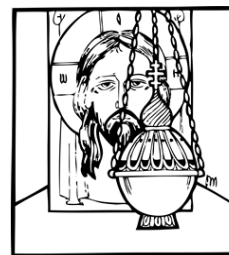

Excerpt from Christ our Pascha: The Incarnation of the Son of God

The Nativity of Christ: The Church celebrates the coming of the Son of God into the world with the feast of the Nativity of Christ. A Note from Father Geoff

Dear Brothers and Sisters,

"And lead us not into temptation, but deliver us from evil." This is how our Lord concluded the prayer he taught his disciples to use. (Mt. 6:9-13; Lk. 11.2-4) This phrase - "Lead us not into temptation" - is a curious one. Isn't *Satan* the tempter? Indeed. St. James even goes so far as to write, "When tempted, no one should say, 'God is tempting me.' For God cannot be tempted by evil, nor does he tempt anyone." (James 1:13)

So what is behind this phrase? The Greek word translated as "temptation" is *peirasmos*, but it can also simply mean a trial or a test. One modern translation of the *Pater noster* phrases it this way: "Save us from the time of trial."

Throughout our lives we have all sorts of various trials, temptations, and spiritual tests. There are times - and will be times - that we struggle to maintain the faith with integrity. St. Anthony of Egypt said to St. Poemen, "This is the great work of a man: to always take the blame for his own sins before God and *to expect temptation to his last breath.*"

So this is the human condition. We are in a state of spiritual struggle and will be until we meet our Lord face to face in the age to come. But we do not struggle on our own! We do not strive without hope! "Save us from the time of trial!" We can call out to God to "deliver us from evil," because we know with sure and certain hope that God has *already* defeated evil, sin, death, and hell. We can confidently face our trials because God in Christ has *already* conquered in the fight! "It is finished," Jesus declared on the Cross. (John 19:13)

Our own trials and temptations must always be seen in this light, the light of Christ's victory. So we can pray with great assurance, "Lead us not into temptation, but deliver us from evil," confident that our Lord will never abandon us in our time of need.

Twenty Ninth Sunday after Pentecost

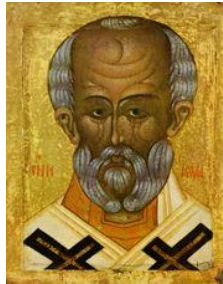


The Fathers of the Church see a lesson in today's Gospel reading for us. The ten lepers signify mankind. We are all leprous, but only one in ten give thanks to God for the salvation He has brought to us. In the same way, only some of the seed sown by God (in the Parable of the Sower) brings forth good fruit. We can all be cleansed by Him, but if we do not return to Him in gratitude and to glorify Him, we cannot be saved.

It is only by the power of the Holy Spirit that we can win the battle that is going on inside us. The role of the Holy Spirit is to reveal to us who Jesus is and to convict us of our state. As we see that we are infected with the leprosy of sin, and as we experience the healing that Jesus has performed within us through the shedding of His blood on the cross, we can turn back to Him, fall on our knees at his feet, and thank Him, acknowledging His power and glory.

St Nicholas the Wonderworker and Archbishop of Myra in Lycia, Dec. 6

Saint Nicholas, Archbishop of Myra is transformed in our modern secular culture as Santa Claus - the man in the red suit who brings gifts at Christmas to all those who are good. It is interesting - and telling - to consider what the Church remembers him for. Yes, he is said to have punched Arias in the nose for denying the divinity of Jesus. But most of the stories that come to us through history are of him living the Christian life - like providing a dowry to three young women so they could marry and avoid slavery (the three bags of gold he threw through their windows landed in their stockings, and so today we hang our stockings by the chimney with care). All of the stories about Archbishop Nicholas that come to us through history are about his love for people - especially the poor. St. Nicholas was good. So good that his goodness shines through history - and radiates even from the man in the red suit. Such goodness can only be found in one who dwells intimately with Lord - for He is the only good One (Mt 19:17).

The Maternity of St. Anne, December 8

Celebrated for many centuries under a variety of titles, the feast widely known in the Eastern Church as the Feast of the Conception by St. Anna is celebrated in the Roman Church as the Feast of the Immaculate Conception. This Feast commemorates Saint Anna's conception of Mary, the Mother of God.



Anna and Joachim had lived devoutly in marriage for fifty years. They gave a third of their income to the poor and a third to the Temple in Jerusalem. Still, they were scorned for being without offspring. With heavy hearts, they prayed that God would bless them with a child to comfort them in their old age. The Almighty God answered their prayers by allowing Anna to conceive a child who would be the Mother of God's own Son, Jesus Christ.

Nativity Fast Nov.15 - Dec.24

Who do you say that I am?

"But you", He said, "Who do you say that I am?" Then Simon Peter spoke up, "You are the Christ," he said, "the Son of the living God." Matthew 16:15,16

"Who do you say that I am?" Was there ever such a penetrating question? Our answer to this question reveals not only who we think Christ is, but also who we are. Many of those who first heard Jesus ask this question were men and women of the Law. This is why they thought Jesus only a prophet. But Simon Peter could truly see Jesus for Who He Is. In his answer Peter revealed himself to be a man of God.



What of our answers to the question of Jesus? What do our answers say about us? Are we men filled with the Holy Spirit? One of the most ancient titles Christians give themselves was "Christ-bearers." From the very first we have been aware that we are called "to bear the mysteries of God," to bear Christ to the world. As we prepare to greet Christ in His Nativity and His Baptism in the Jordan, we should look to our life. Do we bear Christ in all of our life, or only in those parts of our life we consider "religious" or "spiritual"?

May our life during this season bear witness to the reality that "Christ is among us!" May our life answer that Jesus is "the Christ, the Son of the living God."
