

A Note from Father Geoff

Dear Brothers and Sisters.

We are now in the ten days that separate the Feast of our Lord's Ascension from the Feast of Pentecost, when we remember and celebrate the coming of the Holy Spirit in power. Before our Lord was taken up into glory, Jesus said to his disciples: "And behold, I am sending the promise of my Father upon you. But stay in the city until you are clothed with power from on high" (Luke 24.49). So the disciples waited.

Waiting is a hard discipline in any context. It is especially hard for us in the era of on-demand movie streaming, text messages, and Amazon Prime deliveries. But they waited.

The People of God had waited hundreds of years for the prophecies of Isaiah and Zechariah to be fulfilled in the coming of the Messiah at Christmas. Mary, in her great *Magnificat* exclaimed: "He has brought down the mighty from their thrones, and has exalted the humble and meek; He has filled the hungry with good things and the rich he has sent away empty" (Luke 1.52-53); and yet she waited another 33 year years for the death and resurrection of Christ. And now, having met and known Christ, the disciples find themselves again waiting; waiting for the fulfillment of the Prophet Joel: "I will pour out my Spirit on all flesh; your sons and your daughters shall prophesy, your old men shall dream dreams, and your young men shall see visions..." (Joel 2.28)

Today we are still waiting; waiting for the culmination of all things; waiting to see the Lord's promises fulfilled *in our own sight* and not just as a promise for the future. We are waiting to see God's kingdom come here on earth as it is in heaven. But in the time between Ascension and Pentecost, the disciples give us an example of how to behave. After Christ was taken up in glory, the Acts of the Apostles tells us, "Then they returned to Jerusalem from the mount called Olivet...And when they had entered, they went up to the upper room, where they were staying... [and they] with one accord were devoting themselves to prayer..." (Acts 1.12-14)

In our own lives, while we wait to see the Lord's action and power; while we wait to see justice fulfilled and people reconciled to each other; while we wait for the hungry to be fed and the humble to be exalted, we do not wait aimlessly. We can devote ourselves to unity and to prayer. We can pray for the kingdom of God to be realized here on earth as in heaven, for the forgiveness of our own sins, for the Spirit of God to come upon all humanity, and for our brothers and sisters in Christ in all of their pilgrimages and struggles.

May the Lord who united humanity and divinity in the Incarnation, and who is seated at the right hand of the Father, grant us his Holy Spirit anew, that we may love, serve, and please him in this life, and enjoy his presence in the age to come of life everlasting.

Sunday of the Holy Fathers of the First Ecumenical Council in Nicea

Moved with divine zeal and concern for unity, the Emperor Constantine the Great, equal to the Apostles, summoned the First Ecumenical Council in Nicaea, a city of Bithynia. It was in this place that the bishops of the Church gathered in 325. All of them, with one mouth and one voice, declared that the Son and Word of God is one in essence with the Father, true God of true God. The Fathers composed the holy symbol of Faith, the Nicene Creed:

The Nicean-Constantinopolitan Symbol of Faith was brought to our ancestors by the Apostles of the Slavs, SS. Cyril and Methodius, in the ninth century. Since that time our ancestors jealously preserved its integrity and proudly professed it throughout the centuries" with one voice and one heart" (cf. Divine Liturgy) in their wooden churches under the Carpathian



Mountains. This very same faith our forefathers brought with them to the blessed shores of America and passed it on as a priceless treasure to their posterity with the following words:

"We have seen the true light, we have received the heavenly Spirit, we have found the true faith, and we worship the undivided Trinity, for the Trinity has saved us" (cf. Divine Liturgy).

Let us recall the words of our modern Confessor, Blessed Bishop Paul P. Gojdich, OSBM. (d. 1960), who said: "Faith is not an item of trade or gain, but is our spiritual treasure, assuring us great consolation on earth and opening for us the gates of heaven after we die. It is this true faith, which was given to us by the Son of God and which the Catholic Church teaches; and it is not the one invented by men."

Let us then heed the admonition of another "hero of faith" of ours, our martyred Bishop Theodore G. Romzha (d. 1947): "Our greatest treasure here on earth is our faith, for which we should be ready to sacrifice even our own lives. If we must die, let us die as martyrs, fearlessly professing and defending our faith!"

> He will come again in glory to judge the living and the dead, and his kingdom will have no end. (Symbol of Faith)

We Prepare to Celebrate Pentecost

Next Sunday we will celebrate Pentecost Sunday, which is a celebration of the fulfillment of the promises of God. As a parish community we will also celebrate the revelation of the Trinity, the coming of the Holy Spirit, the day our holy tradition views as the beginning of the Church. Let us remember that this not simply the celebration of an event which took place centuries ago. It is the



celebration of what must happen and does happen to us in the Church today. We all have died and risen with the Messiah-King, and we all have received his Most Holy Spirit. We are the "temples of the Holy Spirit." God's Spirit dwells in us. We, by our own membership in the Church, have received "the seal of the gift of the Holy Spirit" in the sacrament-mystery of chrismation. Pentecost has happened to us!

It is also Spirit is also known as the Green Sunday. Why? Green is the color of spring and summer, the color of life, and life is an attribute of the Holy Spirit, "the Lord and giver of Life" who animates us all. In commemoration of Pentecost, please wear green to celebrate this day!
