

Dear Brothers and Sisters,

Independence Day is a good time for us as Catholics to give thanks and pray for our country. We have so much to be grateful for: our freedoms and opportunities and rights. Along with these freedoms and rights, we also - as Christians - have great opportunities to serve as good citizens and show the love of God to our neighbors.

This weekend, as we celebrate in various ways, let us also not neglect to pray for our country. And this means not just praying vaguely for "our government and all in the service of our country." It means praying specifically and intentionally for our communities, our elected officials both nationally and regionally, those who provide essential services, and our neighbors. It means praying for those who agree with us and those who disagree. It means asking God's blessing both on those who love us and on those who hate us. Because this is the way of the Savior that we serve.

As the political landscape in our nation has become more and more polarized, it would be good for us to remember the words of our Lord:

You have heard that it was said, "You shall love your neighbor and hate your enemy." For he makes his sun rise on the evil and on the good, and sends rain on the just and the unjust. (Matthew 5.43-45)

A Prayer for our Country

In the time of prosperity, fill our hearts with thankfulness, and in the day of trouble, do not allow our trust in you to fail; for we ask this through Jesus Christ our Lord, who together with you and the Holy Spirit lives and reigns, now and ever, and forever. Amen.

Fourth Sunday after Pentecost

How great must have been the faith of the Centurion who came to Christ asking for a healing of his servant, whom he loved, who was faithful to him. He heard Christ say, "I will come and heal him.", and he could answer, "Lord, I am not worthy to have you come under my roof; but only say the word, and my servant will be healed."

This is an event of the life of Christ; it is an event that touched not only the Centurion, not only his servant, but every member of the household. He came without Christ, and the servant was healed. Who of us, in dire, agonizing pain is capable of turning to the Lord, present



Him his request, ask Him to show mercy and to manifest His power, and when the Lord says to us, in our hearts, 'I shall come, I shall work this miracle for you' - who of us would have the courage to say, 'No, Lord! Your word is enough!'...

And again, who of us, at moments when the Lord came close to us, have the thought of saying such words, realizing because of the holiness of Christ, the holiness of God, how unworthy we are of Him, of His life, His teaching, His example, His death, His descent into hell, to the very rock bottom of evil. And this hell is not only an image; isn't it within us? Isn't there in us a darkness that needs more than enlightenment - the Light of God, God, the light of the world?

On this Sunday the amazing centurion's faith was manifested. So often when we pray, we ask the Lord insistently to come close to us, to make His presence felt, so that we may clearly feel His power. This man acted with great simplicity, saying to Christ, "No don't trouble yourself to come. I am a sinful man and not worthy that you should enter under my roof, but just say the word and my servant will be healed. One word from God - that was what the man asked for, not the joy of contact which we all long. Today, we ask the Lord that He should fulfill our requests and, in addition to that, grant us the miraculous joy of His presence. Amen.

The Fathers on Scripture - Some argue that the Centurion, by his description, implied the reason why he had not brought his servant to Jesus saying, "Lord, my servant is lying paralyzed at home, in terrible distress," as though he was at his last gasp, or even as Luke said, he was "at the point of death." In my opinion, however, the reason he had not brought him in was itself a sign of his great faith, even much greater than those who let the patient down through the roof. Because the Centurion knew for certain that even a mere command was enough for raising the servant up, he thought it unnecessary to bring him.

Independence Day

In God's plan of history – that mysterious drama that unites God's providential care with our freedom – there are particular moments that reveal with glittering clarity that God is in charge. For Americans, Independence Day marks the anniversary of such a moment.



Nearly two and half centuries ago, on July 4, 1776, members of the

Continental Congress approved Jefferson's magnificent Declaration of Independence, proclaiming that all men are created equal, that they are endowed by their Creator with certain inalienable rights, that among these are Life, Liberty, and the pursuit of Happiness.

For the first time a nation sprang forth, not simply from the bond of people living together in a place for years, but rather from an idea, the principle of the truth of the human person as sacred and unrepeatable. The Declaration acknowledged our origin as beings made by God, with rights God himself gave us. It is God's law – his plan – that declares unequivocally that in our creation by the divine hand rests our equal liberty and the right inherent in us as God's creatures. Our liberty arises not from us, but from the one who made us.

Independence Day honors not our own artificial schemes of liberty and equality but the founding principle of natural law that protects who we are: each one of us chosen, loved, and created as free beings by God our Father. No other authority will do: nothing other than divine truth provides proper grounding for ordered liberty. On God's authority, then, the American founders in 1776, "with a firm reliance on the Protection of divine providence," ventured forth in the great experiment, mutually pledging "to each other our Lives, our Fortunes, and our Sacred Honor."
