Light as a Feather - It is one thing to be broken but something else again to be crushed. Sizeable pieces of whatever is broken remain, but whatever gets crushed is reduced to dust and utterly eliminated. The stone does not break those who fall upon it, but those who fall on the stone break themselves. Their destruction, therefore, is not attributable to the stone's strength but to the violence with which they fall upon it. How hard do we hit the stone when we fall upon it? That is determined by the weight of our sins. But repentance can make us as light as a feather. Remember Isaiah 53:5 - But he was wounded for our transgressions, he was crushed for our iniquities; upon him was the chastisement that made us whole, and with his stripes we are healed.



A Note from Father Geoff

Dear Brothers and Sisters,

Many of you may know - but some may not - that there is a set of prayers, prayed by the priest (and deacon), before the Divine Liturgy begins, called the **Proskomedia** or **Prothesis**, which means "preparation." In it, the bread and wine are prepared for Communion and this service sets the stage, as it were, for all that is to come.

In this service, we commemorate several classifications of saints and angels: the honorable and heavenly angelic powers; St. John the Baptist and all the prophets; the holy apostles; the great hierarchs (bishops) of the Church; the martyrs; the venerable monastics; the charitable wonderworkers; the ancestors of God Joachim and Anna; and the saints commemorated on the particular day of the liturgy.

Then we pray for the Pope, the Metropolitan Archbishop, and all the clergy and people. We remember the person or people for whom the liturgy is being offered, whether deceased or living. And there is an opportunity to remember all the members of the church; all those in need; all sorts and conditions of people.

This is important, because the Divine Liturgy is offered "always and everywhere" for all people. As we sing in the Eucharistic prayer: "And remember all your people."

Whenever we celebrate the Divine Liturgy, we are joining our voices with all the heavenly hosts - the martyrs and saints of ages past, the ranks of angelic hosts. We are uniting our voices with all those celebrating the Eucharist throughout the world in our own day. And we are even in some way praying with our separated brothers and sisters who also love and serve our Lord Jesus.

Whenever we come to the Liturgy, we can know that the Sacrifice of Jesus Christ on Calvary is being made present to us again, as its power and efficacy reaches to every person of every time and place. In it Christ is reconciling us to the Father and bringing about the reconciliation of all things.

So when we come to worship together at the Eucharist, we can lift up the concerns of our lives, the needs of our families and friends, our hopes and fears, our anxieties and our dreams, and place them on the altar. God hears us and promises his blessings.

Thanks be to God who desires good things for his children and calls us to the privilege of worshiping him in spirit and in truth.

Thirteenth Sunday after Pentecost

You need only to look at the vine to be reminded of your own nature, that is, if you observe it intelligently. No doubt you remember the image used by the Lord in which he says that he is the vine and the Father the vinedresser. Each of us who have been grafted onto the Church by faith he calls branches, and he urges us to bear much fruit so as not to be rejected as useless and thrown onto the fire.

Throughout the Scriptures the Lord continually likens human souls to vines. He says for instance: My beloved had a vineyard on a fertile hillside; and again: I planted a vineyard and put a hedge round it. Clearly it is human souls that he calls his vineyard, and the hedge he has put round them is the security of his commandments and the protection of the angels; for the angel of the Lord will

encamp around those who fear him. Moreover, by establishing in the Church apostles in the first place, prophets in the second, and teachers in the third, he has surrounded us as though by a firmly planted palisade.

In addition, the Lord has raised our thoughts to heaven by the examples of saints of past ages. He has kept them from sinking to the earth where they would deserve to be trampled on, and he wills that the bonds of love, like the tendrils of a vine, should attach us to our neighbors and make us rest on them, so that always climbing upward like vines growing on trees, we may reach the loftiest heights.

He also requires that we allow ourselves to be weeded. To be spiritually weeded means to have renounced the worldly ambitions that burdened our hearts. Anyone who has renounced the love of material things and attachment to possessions, or who has come to regard as despicable and deserving of contempt the poor, wretched glory of this world, is like a weeded vine. Freed from the profitless burden of earthly aspirations, that person can breathe again.

Finally, following out the implications of the comparison, we must not run to wood, or, in other words, show off or seek the praise of outsiders. Instead, we must bear fruit by reserving the display of our good works for the true vinedresser.

Nativity of Mary, the Mother of God September 8th

He illumined them not only with temporal joy, but with eternal joy as well. God gave them just one daughter, and she would later give them just one grandson-but what a daughter and what a Grandson!

Mary, Full of grace, Blessed among women, the Temple of the Holy Spirit, the Altar of the Living God, the Table of the Heavenly Bread, the Ark of God's Holiness, the Tree of the Sweetest Fruit, the Glory of the race of man, the Praise of womanhood, the Fount of virginity and purity-this was the daughter given by God to Joachim and Anna. She was born in Nazareth, and at the age of three, was taken to the Temple in Jerusalem. In her young womanhood she returned again to Nazareth, and shortly thereafter heard the Annunciation of the Holy Archangel Gabriel concerning the birth of the Son of God, the Savior of the world, from her most-pure virgin body.

We extol you, O Most Holy Virgin, and we venerate the holy ancestors of God, and we celebrate your glorious Nativity!


