

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#### **A Note from Father Geoff**

Dear Brothers and Sisters,

The biblical scholar N.T. Wright wrote, "Many people today assume that Christianity is one or more of these things - a religion, a moral system, a philosophy. In other words, they assume that Christianity is about advice. But it wasn't and isn't. Christianity is, simply, good news. It is the news that something has happened as a result of which the world is a different place."

Whenever we come together to celebrate the Eucharist, it is precisely this "something that has happened" that we are celebrating. We are commemorating and re-presenting the once-for-all sacrifice of Jesus Christ: "the cross, the tomb, the resurrection on the third day, the ascension into heaven, the sitting at the right hand, and the second coming in glory."

So when we begin the Divine Liturgy, it is natural that the first thing we would do is pray the **Litany of Peace**. In it, we pray for many things: peace, salvation, the Church, the world, secular authorities, the sick, the suffering, the departed, etc. Sometimes the priest or deacon will insert additional prayer intentions.

Because to celebrate this saving work of Christ is not only to personally receive his Body and Blood (though we certainly do this, and we should do it frequently). In the Liturgy we also plead the Blood of Christ on behalf of everyone and all things. After all, St. Paul tells us that Christ's work has universal significance: "In Christ, God was reconciling the world to himself, not counting their trespasses against them." (2 Corinthians 5.19)

In the Litany of Peace we remember before God all sorts and conditions of people. And St. John tells us, "This is the confidence that we have toward Him, that if we ask anything according to his will he hears us." (1 John 5.14)

So, when we come to the Liturgy on Sundays or holy days, we would do well to take some time in preparation; to remember those whom we would ask the Lord to bless and protect. Let us hold them in our hearts as we raise our voices in praise and prayer to God. Because we know that Jesus himself holds them even more closely in his own Most Sacred Heart.


#### **A Prayer for Those We Love**

# Exaltation of the Cross, September 14

The cross is raised and appears above the earth, which until recently malice had kept hidden. It is raised, not to receive glory (for with Christ nailed to it what greater glory could it have?) but to give glory to God who is worshiped on it and proclaimed by it.

It is not surprising that the church rejoices in the cross of Christ and robes herself in festal clothes, revealing her bridal beauty as she honors this day. Nor is it surprising that this great throng of people has gathered together today to see the cross exposed aloft and to worship Christ whom they see raised upon it. For the cross is exposed in order to be raised and is raised to be exposed.



What cross? The cross, which a little while ago was hidden in a place called "The Skull" but now is everywhere adored. This is what we rejoice over today; this is what we celebrate; this is the point of the present feast; this is the manifestation of the mystery. For this hidden and life-giving cross had to be exposed, set on high like a city on a hill or a lamp on a stand, for all the world to see.

## **Excerpt from Christ Our Pascha**

The Signs of the Coming of the Kingdom: The Works of Christ: Healing is only possible when faith—one's openness to God—is present: "Do you believe that I am able to do this?" (Mt 9:28). Faith opens a person to receive God's gift, whereas unbelief becomes an obstacle to the reception of this gift: "And [ Jesus] did not do many deeds of power [in Nazareth], because of their unbelief" (Mt 13:58). As the signs of God's action in the time of Christ were his miracles, so in the life of the Church the signs are the Holy Mysteries. The grace of God acts in the Holy Mysteries through external signs such as water, oil, bread, and wine, as well as various liturgical gestures and actions. By receiving the Holy Mysteries, a person conquers sinful inclinations and grows in virtue. (#214)
