

A Note from Father Geoff

Dear Brothers and Sisters,

In the Divine Liturgy, after the first two Antiphons and before the third Antiphon, the clergy make the **Little Entrance**, with the Book of the Holy Gospels. This is accompanied by the faithful singing the **Hymn of the Incarnation**, sometimes called "Justinian's Hymn," because the Emperor Justinian (482-565) was responsible for its use in the Liturgy. The words of the ancient hymn are:

O only-begotten Son and Word of God, who being immortal, deigned for our salvation to become incarnate of the holy Theotokos and Ever-Virgin Mary, and became man without change; you were also crucified, O Christ our God, and by death have trampled Death, being One of the Holy Trinity, glorified with the Father and the Holy Spirit, save us!

This is a remarkable and beautiful hymn, the lyrics of which are really a series of profound theological statements. In this hymn we exclaim that Jesus Christ is fully God and fully human. We affirm that Mary is the God-bearer and that she conceived our Lord as a Virgin. We proclaim the paradoxical and mystical changelessness of Jesus Christ who, even though he was born in time, is "the same yesterday, today, and forever" (Hebrews 13.8). We affirm his crucifixion and death. We boldly proclaim that he has destroyed death. And we affirm our faith in the Holy Trinity.

This hymn is kind of like a Creed. However, unlike the Nicene Creed, which is a series of statements of belief, *this* hymn puts those statements of belief in the form of a prayer of petition. All of those statements about Jesus Christ, the Son and Word of God, are really *one*, *long invocation*, followed by the very simple request: "Save us!"

The Prophet Joel foretold of a time when "everyone who calls upon the name of the Lord will be saved" (Joel 2.32). St. Paul quotes this prophecy in his Epistle to the Romans, when he says, "The same Lord is Lord of all and richly blesses all who call on him, for 'everyone who calls upon the name of the Lord will be saved'" (Rom. 10.13)

And calling upon the Name of the Lord Jesus Christ is *precisely* what we're doing in this hymn. We are calling upon him who is the eternal, only-begotten Son and Word of God. We are invoking the one who was born of a Virgin. And, more than that, we are making all of these claims about Jesus with the recognition that *all* he did, he did "for our salvation." We are richly blessed when we call upon his name in this hymn.

Thanks be to God who was willing to become flesh for us, become obedient unto death for our salvation, and who has destroyed the power of death. May we never cease to sing the praises of his great mercy!

Seventeenth Sunday after Pentecost

But love your enemies, and do good, and lend, expecting nothing in return; and your reward will be great, and you will be sons of the Most High; for He is kind to the ungrateful and the selfish. Be merciful, even as your Father is merciful.

In today's Gospel, Jesus challenges us with a very personal question about motives. In every moral action of a human being there is a purpose, a motive, which "motivates" us to act. Sadly, in most instances, that motivation is for personal gain. I give someone a loan so as to hope for more in return. I love another because I was first loved by them. I do good to another because the other is doing good to me. I forgive another only if they first ask for forgiveness from me. Such is the world's approach to life – to live my life for personal advancement, and for personal gain.



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Today Jesus challenges us to rise above this common approach to our moral actions, by inviting us to become "children of the Most High" and thereby beginning to live and act according to God's way of acting. It is Jesus who is Love Incarnate, and because he is God from all eternity, he needs nothing, he lacks nothing. There is nothing that God's creation can give him that he does not already possess. Hidden within this reality and revelation of the perfect nature of God is a simple but beautifully related truth: that God's love is totally self-less. While the world would like us to believe that we will obtain happiness and fulfillment by the acquisition of things, the Lord challenges this thinking by turning it on its head, and showing us that we—made in the image and likeness of God—will only discover fulfillment and happiness when we learn to give of ourselves for the sake of others. True wealth is not the acquisition of things, but the acquisition of God's way of life.

Respect Life Sunday Today

Every October the Catholic Church in the United States celebrates Respect Life Month, and the first Sunday of October is observed as Respect Life Sunday. As Catholics, we are called to cherish, defend, and protect those who are most vulnerable, from the beginning to the end of their lives, and at every point in between. During the month of October, the Church asks us to reflect more deeply on the dignity of every human life.



Let us pray:

That on this Respect Life Sunday our resolve may be strengthened to uphold the dignity of every human life; Let us pray to the Lord: Lord have Mercy.

The Body and Blood of Christ Poured Out for the Life of the World

The world receives the gift of Christ first in the Incarnation, and then in the Cross and the Resurrection. In Christ, God has become one of us. He has united Himself to us. He has entered into our suffering. Christ is pure, innocent, loving, just and meek. The poor love Him. His friends love Him. He speaks with authority. He is courageous when He teaches openly against the sins of corrupt religious and political leaders. He serves and teaches freely and willingly, without compulsion. In His ministry, He gives Himself as a gift in love. He gives Himself as a gift to all, but He is not received by all with joy. Whether out of envy or malice or greed, the Lord God made flesh, the gift of Christ, is betrayed, slandered, mocked, spit upon, beaten, scourged, abandoned, falsely accused, and cruelly put to death. The gift given freely is received without gratitude. On the night before the horror of the Crucifixion took place, He revealed to His disciples the purpose of His sacrificial offering. On the Cross, Jesus gives His life for our life. God, in His flesh, willingly suffers on the Cross. He pours out His body and blood for the life and salvation of the world. Before the Divine Liturgy begins, the priest prepares bread and wine for the Eucharistic offering with prayers and a ritual. The service is called the Proskomide. The seal on the bread is in the form of a square with the letters inscribed, "ICXC NIKA," or "Jesus Christ Conquers." The seal is called the Lamb. Taking the lance, the priest traces the sign of the cross over the lamb and says, "In remembrance of our Lord God and Savior Jesus Christ." Then, symbolically, mystically rather, the priest cuts the lamb out of the bread according to the ritual with particular prayers such as, "Like a sheep, He was led to the slaughter," "Like a spotless lamb, silent before its shearer, He opens not His mouth," etc. Christ is not re-sacrificed, but rather His sacrifice is represented. In the Eucharist, the gift of Christ, the one who offers and is offered, is made present at the hands of the priest.
