#### A Note from Father Geoff

Dear Brothers and Sisters,

We continue our "walk" through the Divine Liturgy. After the Homily, we have another litany - called **The Litany of Fervent Supplication**, because it is intoned by the deacon with the words, *"with our whole soul and with our whole mind, let us say,"* indicating that we are praying here more intensely and ardently. Then follows the wonderful **Cherubikon** or **Cherubic Hymn**.

In this profound hymn of preparation for the Eucharist - which roughly equivalent to the "Offertory Hymn" in the Western churches - the congregation finds itself, in a mysterious way, being likened to the Angels in heaven. Jesus teaches that angels in heaven, *"always behold the face of [his] Father."* (Matthew 18.10) *"Let us who mystically represent the Cherubim,"* we sing. Just as the Angels in glory constantly worship the Holy Trinity, so we are, in a sense, entering the nearer presence of God. This hymn refers to a wonderful vision that the Prophet Isaiah saw in the 8th century B.C.:

...I saw the Lord, high and exalted, seated on a throne, and the train of his robe filled the temple. Above him were Seraphim, each with six wings...and they were calling to one another: "Holy, Holy, Holy is the Lord of hosts. Heaven and earth are filled with his glory." (Isaiah 6)

We will come again to this hymn once the Anaphora (or Eucharistic prayer) begins. But we are already seeing a foreshadowing of it in the Cherubikon. We are now beginning to join our voices with the Angels, whom we "represent" here on earth, as the King of Glory will become present for us on the "throne" of the altar in the mystical form of bread and wine.

We are enjoined to *"lay aside all earthly cares."* We have remembered our needs and the needs of our friends, family, and neighbors in the litanies which preceded this point. But now we "set aside" these anxieties and concerns, as we come into the throneroom of God. And why? *"That we may receive the King of All,"* as he comes to us in the Eucharist.

May God grant us grace to always see with the eyes of faith, the heavenly reality that we are participating in when we come together to receive the Eucharist. And let us not forget that we are surrounded by God's heavenly hosts who are always guiding and protecting us, though they always, at the same time, stand in the presence of God and worship him in Triune glory.

### Twenty-Second Sunday after Pentecost

Today's Gospel reading is not only about miracles and the mercy of God; to me it is about hope beyond hope. In the story of the daughter of Jairus we see a child already dead; everyone knows about it; there is such certainty that when the Son of God, become the Son of Man, says, No! This child has not died, it is fallen asleep, and everyone contradicts Him: No, this child has died. Then Christ, with a word of power, but in an act of love calls the child to earthly life again.

Isn't this, - apart from being a true event of our human history, - isn't this also a parable, and an image of so many human situations? How often we would say, "There is no point in doing anything about this person, this person is lost anyhow; there is nothing to do about redeeming a given

situation, this situation is beyond redemption." And we must remember the words which were spoken by Christ to Peter when he said, "Who then can be saved?

The Lord said to him, what is impossible to man, is possible unto God." In the case of this child it happened immediately. In our relation to one another and to people it may take years, years of patient love, years during which we will give ourselves, but also endure, endure endlessly the most unendurable things; and in the end there can be redemption. There can be redemption on this earth, in the form of a person who was thought to be hopeless, beyond help, and who begins to change, and then we see a miracle, and we are elated, and hope becomes complete and real, and joy fills our heart.

But there is also another way in which this sacrificial love can be redemption. A western theologian has said around the time of the last war, when feelings were deep and pain acute, he said that suffering is the meeting place between evil and humanity; suffering is always caused by human agency or human agency turns away from it and does not alleviate it. And suffering always cuts into the soul or into the body of people. But when it has happened, the victim acquires divine power to forgive, and by forgiveness to undo the evil, and to redeem those who have done the evil. This is also hope beyond hope. And to me it is connected with this contrast between the sinful, the false, the blind knowledge expressed by the people in the house: they laugh at Christ, they know that the child is dead, hope is superfluous, it is drowned in despair, and the victory of love and of mercy which is shown in the event but which can extend in so many ways into our personal lives on the simplest level, and on the most heroic ones. Let us therefore give thought to it, and choose for hope beyond hope, for that love and that faith that conquer. Amen.

## The Feast of the Holy Archangel Michael and all Angels, November 8

According to our holy father Bishop Nicholai of Zica, "Whom Christ loves, His angels love too." As we read the Holy Scripture, we see that Our Savior loved children and ordered His angels to be their guardians. In the Gospel reading from St. Matthew 18: 10, we read the following: "The angels do always behold the face of my Father, which is in heaven."



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Our Lord even identified Himself with little children saying: "Whoever receives one little child like this in My name receives Me" (Mt. 18:5). He threatened terribly those who mislead, scandalize, and cause children to sin: "It were better for him that a millstone were hanged about his neck, and that he were drowned in the depth of the

sea" (Mt. 18:6). He also said: "Suffer little children to come unto Me for of such is the kingdom of heaven" (Mt. 19:14). This is the very foundation of Christian education, that is, to let children come unto Christ. This is the reason the angels love and protect children.

The Fathers of the Church teach us that there are guardian angels of nations, countries, Churches, as well as of individuals (Rev. 2). Our venerable father, John Climacus testifies of his personal guardian angel: "Whenever I was longing for a greater advancement in spiritual life, the angel appeared in such a case and enlightened me." With today's celebration of the Synaxis-Assembly of all the Heavenly Hosts, every Christian should remember his good angel, who for the span of all his life concerns himself with him, rejoices in his spiritual achievements, and grieves over his downfalls. Remember that when a person dies, the angel takes his soul to God. Having found itself in the spirit world, according to many accounts, the soul recognizes its Guardian Angel.
