A Note from Fr. Geoff

Dear Brothers and Sisters,

In his Letter to the Romans, St. Paul writes, "I am not ashamed of the gospel, for it is the power of God for salvation to everyone who believes." (Rom. 1.16) We use this word - "Gospel" - all the time. Of course, there are the four Books we call Gospels: Matthew, Mark, Luke, and John. But the word itself means "Good News." And when St. Paul says the Gospel is the "power of God for salvation" he doesn't mean just the first four books of the New Testament.

So what is this "Gospel of Jesus Christ"? If someone were to say to you, *What is the Gospel?* how would you respond? What is the *Good News of Jesus Christ?* Many people over the centuries have tried to boil down the Gospel to its essence. And not everyone would word it the same way. So here's my attempt to boil it down:

The Gospel is that God has been fully and perfectly revealed in the person in the Person of Jesus Christ. He united humanity to God in his person; he died, descended to the dead, and came back to life again to forgive sins, to defeat Satan, to smash the gates of hell, and to destroy death. He sits at the right hand of God the Father interceding for us all, and has sent the Holy Spirit to enlighten us and advocate for us. In all of this, he offers perfect and sufficient *reconciliation with God* to all who call upon his name.

That's about as succinct as I think I can make it. The Gospel is "Good News" precisely because it means that, in Jesus Christ, every spiritual thing that is against us - sin, moral weakness, sickness, death, the demonic realm, hell - has been decisively dealt with and that friendship with God is offered to all of us. More than that, we have been made *children* of God and heirs of the eternal kingdom.

That is the Gospel which is "the power of God for salvation to everyone who believes." That is why Jesus preached, "Repent and believe the Gospel!" Or, put another way, "Change your mind! And believe the Good News that God is reconciling you!"

Let us cling to this Good News. For, "if God is for us, who can be against us?" (Rom. 8.28) Christ is among us!

Sunday of the Holy Fathers of the Council of Nicaea

Does our Church believe that Christ is coming again? It certainly does. The Sunday after the holy day of the Ascension of our Lord is a good time to think about this Second Advent. The Ascension celebrates his going up to heaven, but now we must focus about his coming down at the end of the world as we know it.

Today's Gospel lesson gives us part of our Lord's farewell prayer as he bid good-bye to the apostles after the Last Supper. Before his prayer he spoke to his friends about his leaving. Christ said, "I go to prepare a place for you ... And I will come again, and receive you unto myself; that where I am, you may also be." Jesus said, "I will come again." On the day of his Ascension, Jesus took his friends to a mountain and rose up before their very eyes. They looked up as a cloud embraced him and took him from their sight. Still they gazed heavenward.



Finally two angels appeared and said to them: "you men of Galilee, why do you stand gazing into heaven? This same Jesus, which is taken up from you into heaven, shall so come in like manner as you have seen him go..." What did the angels say? They said Jesus shall come down again. The Nicene Creed expresses this belief in the coming of Christ: "and he shall come again with glory to judge the living and the dead."

When a believing Christian dies and is carried to his resting place. The priest seals the grave, praying: "this grave is sealed until the second coming of Christ." The tomb of the deceased is sealed until Christ comes again to raise the dead. It seems quite clear that our Lord shall come again to earth.

The first time he came in all humility and poverty, born in a stable, with few people aware of his advent. The second time he shall come in all his glory and greatness, heaven poured out with him, and everyone shall be aware of his coming.

Why will Christ come? This is a significant question. He will come to raise the dead, and then he will judge mankind. The resurrection of the dead is the cornerstone of Christian belief. Without this happening and belief, our faith is in vain, useless and without merit to fret about it. Christ will also come to judge. We will have to render an account of our lives to him. He will give to each person his/her due reward.


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The Ascension of the Lord

The Icon of the Ascension is an icon of joy. It celebrates the meaning of this event for the Church and the world. The Ascension took place on the Mount of Olives. Thus, the mountainous background of the panel, dotted with images of scattered olive trees.

The figure of Christ ascending in glory is surrounded by a circular nimbus composed of various bands of color, symbolic of the heavens. This nimbus itself is supported by angels whose presence is yet another indication of the glory and divinity of Christ. It recalls the Old Testament image of God enthroned upon the Cherubim.



In the foreground of the Icon, the image of the Mother of

God is seen surrounded by two groups of Apostles. Of prime importance is her position - directly below Christ. This entire grouping, the Mother of God and the Apostles, stands as an expression of the establishment and role of the Church. The Icon includes not only those who actually witnessed the Ascension. It also includes the Apostle Paul, in the Icon at the head of the group on the right, who historically could not have been there. What is intended is that the Church witnesses to this event.

The Mother of God, she who had once carried the Christ within herself and was therefore the temple of the Incarnate Son of God, stands here as a personification of the Church, the body of Christ, whose head is the ascending Savior. The gesture of her hands, uplifted in faith and prayer, expresses the role of the Church, ceaselessly interceding for the salvation of the world. The direction of movement of this whole group, their gestures, the focus of their eyes and postures, everything is directed upward: toward the Source of Life of the Church, its head Who abides in heaven. For:

He led them out near Bethany, and with hands upraised, blessed them. As He blessed, He left them, and was taken up to heaven. They fell down to do Him reverence, then returned to Jerusalem filled with j oy. There they were to be found in the temple constantly, speaking the praises of God.

Our worship of the Father is one with Christ. Through the Church we are joined with Christ, our hope of glory.


