She will be inducted along with the rest of her Hall of Fame class on Friday, September 22nd at the Petersen Events Center on the Pitt campus. She, along with the rest of her class will be the guests of honor the next day at Acrisure Stadium when the football Panthers play North Carolina. Suzanne was named an All-American swimmer all four years of her collegiate career, becoming only

In addition, she was the 1979 Eastern Conference 100 individual medley champion and earned several All-East honors. Fifth Sunday after Pentcost

In today's Gospel reading, Christ comes to the land of the possessed; there, He is neither idle, nor passive, nor absent: He acts, He heals the possessed men; and what happens, what is the response of the people? They are in terror because they have seen the power of God manifested in such a way that fills them with fear, not with awe. And they ask Christ to be gone: Leave our realm, go away! The fact that Christ has acted, that He has healed, that He has saved the men, matters nothing; what matters, is that they have to pay the cost for it: their pigs.

Isn't it again something which we happen to do? We ask God to come into our lives; and suddenly we discover that God is not coming in the way in which we want Him to be! He is not coming into our lives simply to order things according to our view; He transforms the dead orderliness of our life into a chaos, but a chaos with possibilities - but we don't want this! We want what we had: an orderly life, without problems, without anything great happening, also without anything tragic happening.

Last week we read the story of the centurion to whom Christ said, 'I will come to your house and heal the servant'. And he said, 'No, Lord, there is no need for you to come, I trust you, it's enough for you to say a word - and everything will be right'. Christ need not come; and in our lives, how often has He said the word: the whole Gospel is Christ's word addressed to us; the whole Gospel is made of words that can give us life eternal. You remember the passage when Christ has spoken incomprehensible words to those who surrounded Him, and many of His disciples left; and He turned to the twelve, and said, 'Are you also going to leave Me?' - and Peter said, 'No - where should we go? You have the words of life eternal'. Christ has never spoken of life eternal, never given descriptions of it; the words of life eternal were words that awoke eternal life within those who heard, who had ears, good will to hear. 'Say a word - and my servant will be healed', Christ is speaking: why isn't that we, His servants, are not healed? Because we don't want to listen!


Is that the way we respond to the Gospel? Let us think of Peter, his awe because he had seen the act of God; and let us think of these people who have also seen the act of God. On this Sunday ask yourself: Who are we: Peter, or the Gergasenes?

Tread on the Necks of Demons

"He said to them, 'Go!" The foul-smelling animals are delivered up, not at the will of the demons but to show how savage the demons can become against man. ... Demons do not give up easily unless they are forcibly overcome. They are doing the harm they are ordered to do. Therefore the foul-smelling animals are delivered up that it may be clear to the demons that they have permission to enter the swine but not to enter man. 
